Nurturing the Seeds of Growth

Next week as a Catholic community we celebrate Shrove Tuesday on Tuesday 1st March (pancake day) and Ash Wednesday on Wednesday 2nd March. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Church season, called Lent. Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar. Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. It is a time to slow down and reflect: unclutter and focus on what matters. It's a time set aside for our intentional acts of caring for others and for growing closer to God. The hope is that this 'work' of Lent leads to our own growth as loving and hopeful people.

At Cardijn College Galilee, homegroups often use a focus on planting seeds, or caring for our environment as a link to the caring work and prayer of Lent. New Literacy Initiative

There is no doubt that effectively reading and writing is crucial in today's world. However, for many students learning to read, write and spell can be challenging and overwhelming! As a staff, we are continually learning and looking for ways to improve our teaching and student's learning.

Over the past year, we have been looking at what the research says about how our brains learn the skills needed for reading and writing and the best pedagogies to support this process. As we know more about 'how the brain develops' as students learn to read, we have changed and updated our practices to follow the research and evidence. For example, we are moving away from what was known as a 'Whole Language Approach' to teaching reading that relied on a three cueing system—and moving towards a 'Science of Reading Approach' that teaches students more about words and how our language works.

This year we are implementing a 'Phonology / Morphology Routine' across the school from Reception to Year 8. 'Phonology' refers to the speech sounds of our language system. 'Morphology' refers to the meaning of sounds in our language system. As part of the routine, the students will also explore the 'grapheme' (the letter or letters) to match the phoneme (sound). In addition, students will build their skills to decode (read) and encode (spell) words.

Below are some of the practices now used in every homeroom across our school.

- Daily participation in phonemic awareness activities either through the Heggerty or Kilpatrick programs that the students are familiar with. Phonological awareness is the ability to hear, identify and manipulate individual or groups of sounds in words e.g. hearing the word 'play', then repeating the word without the /l/ and say they word 'pay'. This skill is essential to becoming a skilled reader.
- Phonics we strongly focus on teaching phonics (understanding the sounds and their connection to the symbols/letters of the alphabet) bat e.g. /b/ /a/ /t/ using an explicit and systematic approach. The sounds are taught systematically from the simple to the more complex.
- Morphology students are explicitly taught suffixes e.g. 'ing' 'er' and prefixes e.g.
 're' 'un' as well as the meaning of words. The concepts are taught in a sequence
 that builds from R-8. Morphology is critical to developing vocabulary, reading and
 spelling skills.
- Building Vocabulary and Background Knowledge Research has shown that reading comprehension is closely linked to a student's background knowledge and vocabulary.

I know this article is very word heavy, with the use of technical language. However, this is the terminology student's will be using in their homerooms. and I thought it might be useful for families as well, so they can talk with their children about what they are learning in their literacy lessons. We are teaching your children the language of language!


SATURDAY SOCCER – REGISTER NOW!
