## CESA Classroom Pulse Check

In week five and six of each term, every student in Catholic Education participates in a Classroom Pulse Check Survey. The survey has been developed to find out how students are currently feeling about their experience in school. It is tailored to allow staff to check in and provide immediate feedback and support.

### What does it ask?

The survey asks students eight questions related to identity, learning, relationships and belonging. There are two versions of the survey: Reception to Year 3 where students respond by clicking on emojis and a Year 4 to Year 12 where students respond by clicking on has three possible responses. The options are "Most of the time", "Sometimes" and "Not very often." Not only does the survey assist staff to understand student perspectives on their experience in school, but it also enables us to identify trends on times of the year when students require greater pastoral attention.

The survey really does help us to find out how students are feeling and then look at what can be done to support them. The aim is simply to "check in" with the students.

# Q & A with our Principal



Recently Macy in Year 9 and Harriet in Year 2 took some time out to get to know our Principal Mr Steve Byrne in a Q & A session here at Galilee Campus. Maddie in Year 9 filmed the chat, so stay tuned on our socials for footage but in the meantime here's a transcript of what they talked about:

Macy: How have you found being the Principal of Cardijn College so far?

Steve: I found it's been very busy and very welcoming. The students and staff have a lot going on, particularly here at Galilee.

M: What's the most challenging part of your job and what's your favourite?

S: The most challenging part is being able to get to everything that I'd like to get to because there's so many things going on, exciting events, but also the learning in the classroom. I just wish I could get to every classroom all of the time. The most rewarding is watching young people grow into fine young men and women.

Harriet: When I grow up, I want to be a police or a movie actress. Why did you want to be a Principal?

S: Good question! I love school, as a student, even as a young boy, and somehow or other, I just couldn't leave school. So, I came back, and I was a teacher, and then, to be a Principal, you don't get to choose, people choose you. So people that I deeply respected said, you should think about being a Principal. Then for Cardijn, there was a panel of special people who selected me to be here, and I gratefully accepted.

M: What advice do you have for a student that wants to be a teacher?

S: Make sure you love children, and enjoy what it is you are going to teach, have lots and lots of energy, because you guys make us work so hard!

M: Can you tell us about what plans you see for Galilee in the coming years?

S: I don't know where to start with Galilee, it's growth is exciting, it means we can do lots of new things. But I also think there's a lot of very special things that go on here that not too many people know about, around the environment and the learning that is going on in literacy and numeracy. I think we can work on the development of the middle school like yourself, and the new facilities that are happening and the growth of the general area around Aldinga!

M: What should we as students do if we want to see a change at our school?

S: There's a number of things you can do. You've got student leaders that you elect, you can work through them, you can write to me, make an appointment. Just send me an email, I'm on the email – pretty easy to work out. Say "I need time to meet with you," and I have met with many students already. I met with a year 8 student yesterday who had a plan to deal with bullying so we sat down and she shared her ideas. I think your voice is very important.

H: When I am not at school I like surf lifesaving, gymnastics and jazz. What do you like to do?

S: Well, you're very busy! I like to stand up paddle surf, I like to walk my daughter's dog, who is a kelpie and like a little child, named cookie.

H: What is your favourite thing about Galilee?

S: I think it's the young people. The youngest primary students, I have been working in a big high school and prior to that I worked at St. Michael's which had Reception to year 7, so getting to know all the little people at Galilee has been great, I have really missed that. I will be getting myself in for a literacy block so that you can show me all the things that you have been learning. Would you do that for me Harriet?

H: How old are you?

S: How old do you think I am?

H: Mmmmm 50?

Steve: 50! I'll take that! Last year I turned 60, but what's age anyway?

H: What is your real name?

Steve: Well, ok so you have probably heard me introduced as Steve Byrne, but my real name is Steven, and I used to get that name whenever I was in trouble with my mother! *Steven...come in here!*


