

FIRST READING Exodus 20:1-17

God spoke all these words. He said, 'I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.

'You shall have no gods except me.

'You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or on earth beneath or in the waters under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. SOCIAL JUSTICE

8 March—International Womens' Day

Pope Francis is making small but significant steps towards greater inclusion of women in decision making and leadership roles in the Church. He has amended Canon Law so that women may be officially recognized as exercising the ministries of Lector and Acolyte. And he has appointed a woman as Under-Secretary to the Synod of Bishops – with the right to vote. This is a good day to pay attention to women's contributions in our local Church too.

In 2020 we marked the twentieth anniversary of the Australian Bishops' response to research on the participation of women in the Catholic Church in Australia. In 2019 the Office for Social Justice published a collection of essays titled *Still Listening to the Spirit: Woman and Man Twenty Years Later*, the book was a collaboration with the Office for the Participation of Women.

In their foreword to the collection, Archbishop Christopher Prowse and Bishop Vincent Long Van Nguyen acknowledge:

... twenty years down the track, women are still listening to the Spirit and seeking to engage the whole Church in a conversation about a more fulsome development of the participation of women in the Church, for the sake of us all, and for the sake of the Reign of God.

There is unfinished business from the action commitments made by the bishops in 2000. There is also an opportunity to contribute to the communal discernment process of the Plenary Council 2020. This collection of essays enrages creatively with both of these elements of the present moment.

COMPLIANCE WITH REGULATIONS

(Current for 23/24 January)

• Attendees at Mass must maintain social distancing of 1:2 sqm.

• Funerals are capped at 200 people, whilst maintaining 1:2 sqm.

• Weddings are capped at 200 people, whilst maintaining 1:2 sqm.

• No beverage or food consumption (ie cup of tea after Mass)

• Singing as a congregation is to be avoided.

• Except for families and household groups, people should socially distance. There should be no physical contact outside one's family or household group.

• There should be no shaking of hands or holding hands during the Mass.

• Every gathering must record contact details - either with the QR code for smart phones, or the handwritten log - both located at the entrance to the Church.

• Hand sanitizer is to be available at church entrances.

• Offertory procession will be omitted. Communion is given only in hands. Precious Blood will not be distributed

• Collection plates will not be passed around but a single drop point is provided at the churches.


• Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.

• All surfaces should be cleaned at least daily, with special attention given to frequently touched surfaces.

• Sick and high risk/vulnerable people should be encouraged not to attend.

• Care should be taken at the dismissal and on leaving the church to minimise social contact.

• The obligation for Sunday Mass for the laity HAS NOT BEEN RE-INVOKED at this stage.

(Continued from page 1) SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 1:22-25

While the Jews demand miracles and the Greeks look for wisdom, here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over, to the pagans madness, but to those who have been called, whether they are Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

GOSPEL

John 2:13-25

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.⁷ The Jews replied, 'It has taken fortysix years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The only coins acceptable in the Temple were half shekels. Roman coins were not acceptable because they were imprinted with the image of the Emperor and the Commandments clearly state that there should be no graven images used by Jews. The moneychangers were actually performing a necessary task for the proper functioning of the religious life of Israel.
- The trade in animals was necessary for sacrifice at the Temple. Ordinary people needed to sacrifice for a number of religious reasons; for example, to become ritually clean again after childbirth. But this trade was under a monopoly of the wealthy and elite Sadducees who controlled the Temple cult.
