## YR 7 AND 8 COORDIATOR Rhys Horne

### Year 7

It has been exciting to observe the social, emotional and academic growth of our Year 7 cohort this year.

As part of English for Term 3, students completed a close study of the play, Honey Spot by Jack Davis. Through the relationships between the main characters in Honey Spot, Jack Davis explores the following themes; Discrimination, racism, friendships, relationships, injustice, and celebrating diversity. In Term 4, students learnt how various Polynesian cultures each have distinct but related oral traditions, that is, legends or myths traditionally considered to recount the history of ancient times and the adventures of gods and deified ancestors.

In Maths, during the study of angles, students went on an excursion to Mini Putt Golf, and played a range of games to consolidate their understanding of the content areas being taught. In Science this term students have been learning about dichotomous keys, and the students have greatly enjoyed the display that Kathy made, using resin and bug remains, that showed off a number of different insects and creatures.

### Year 8

As part of English for Term 3, students investigated how language features contribute to the effectiveness of a point of view and used persuasive writing techniques to influence an audience to consider their personal point of view using evidence to back claims.

During Term 4, students selected an influential figure, whom they classified as a hero and wrote a biography using the language conventions of this genre, to inform and influence audience perspectives based on their interpretation of primary and secondary sources. In Maths, students engaged in a range of hands-on learning experiences to cater to their engagement and learning areas. A highlight of these hands-on activities was playing a giant size game of battle ships at the end of week 3, in the outside area. Students thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to waterbomb Byron and we thanked him for being a part of the afternoon.

In Science last term, the students made a boat out of paddle-pop sticks, and it was tested by a number of means to see how well it would float. There were a number of different designs that were made to test the floating capacity of each. The students greatly enjoyed this activity and were able to learn a lot from it. Throughout History, the students have been learning about the historical cultural differences between different people, being Vikings last semester and the Japanese this

semester.







## YR 9 COORDINATOR Sarah Hann

In the classroom, students have been developing their ability to focus and persevere when they find something challenging. In English, students have focused on developing skills to write their own narratives and newspaper articles that draw their readers in. In Maths, students have developed key skills in Statistics by collecting, analysing and interpreting data in real life contexts. Innovation has been a highlight this semester where students have developed their skills in Digital Technologies including coding and film making.

During the month of October, Year 9 participated in a Walk for Mental Health challenge where we clocked up kilometres by going on daily walks. As a cohort we walked 620kms together! It was great to see students embracing the challenge and making connections with each other during our walks. Another highlight for Year 9 has been one of our students getting creative and using the 3D printer. Isaac created and printed 5 themed chess pieces for his Chess Royale Tournament he organised.

Our students have had many successes this semester and overcome different challenges to see personal growth. We are so proud of all our students and what they have achieved this year.









## YR 10 COORDINATOR Jamie Middleton

This semester in Year 10 we have been working on students being present, mindful and understanding the zones of regulation. Students have been working on making positive choices and learning that we each have the power to choose.

In Science we had an excursion to Griffith Uni where we were able to challenge ourselves with differing science experiments. There was also an amazing Science show that showed us what happens when different chemicals and gases are mixed.

In Business the students learned about different types of Businesses and used their own Entrepreneurial skills to create new ideas and methods that could help a current business flourish. In Maths students were looking at a number of topics, none more important than Financial Literacy where they investigated 'real life skills' in Mathematics. In English students have been working on their writing skills both in persuasive and creative writing. Students also went on an excursion to TAFE University to look at different career paths and find out what is required to get into specific courses.

Duke of Edinburgh students have been working to achieve their Bronze of Edinburgh Award. Students have been engaging in a Buddy Reading Program at Mudgeeraba State School each Wednesday for the Service component of their Award, which has improved their leadership, communication and self-confidence. We have also completed two overnight camps, where students were required to be independent and provide their own equipment, food, and lead the bushwalks. These camps provided a challenge in a safe and supportive environment, where students have flourished and built resilience.

The students have grown and matured phenomenally since the start of the year and should be commended for their efforts as a cohort.







### YR 11 COORDINATOR Samantha Dunemann

Throughout Semester 2, Year 11 students engaged in various activities and lessons to support them to gain necessary skills and confidence to engage in the community and begin their transition to Year 12. Year 11 students have been setting measurable goals and taking the steps to successfully reach these goals, whether it be academically, socially, emotionally, school related or personal. Students have shown great enthusiasm with this and have seen that when they put their mind to it, they are able to experience success. Students have also shown commitment to our Advantage Thinking mindset, where each week we have discussed another test and made pledges on how we can ensure we adopt this practice in our daily communication and engagement with others. The growth in students' awareness of Advantage thinking in such a short time has been great to witness.

In the classroom, students have worked with maturity and focus across all subjects as they move closer to their educational goals. In English students have focused on human experiences and explored the many topics in text and their own lives. In Maths, students have looked at financial maths and time and applied this to real world contexts. In Social and Community Studies, students have been exploring communication, conflict resolution and employment. Students have shown commitment across all learning areas and have been able to experience individual and collective success.

The hard work and growth of Year 11 has not gone unnoticed. As a cohort their greatest achievement is their ability to work together and support each other. This has been seen through the many challenges that have been set and the special interest activities that have been led by the students. Students in Year 11 have completed the longest walk possible (virtually), completed collective art projects, engaged in cultural activities to share and create awareness of the many cultures we have in Year 11, and started many interest clubs, all in which has created an Ohana feel in the space. The teaching staff are proud of the efforts displayed this semester by each student in Year 11.





## YR 12 COORDINATOR Michelle Gill

Within the classroom students have been working on building the necessary skills to prepare them for life after school. Whether this be building sustainable study habits for TAFE and University or investigation and practicing the skills needed to obtain a stable job. In English students have focused on the representations of the Australian identity in popular culture texts. In Maths, students developed the mathematical skills of understanding graphs, data and loans. In Social and Community Studies students identified their civil rights and obligations as young Australians. They conducted three social investigations on the impact of cyber crime, the Australian court system and the available support services when dealing with crimes.

The Year 12 cohort have been involved in many extra-curricular activities throughout the semester. This was to create a sense of unity and Ohana spirit amongst the year level. Students participated in their Year 12 camp at Noosa Elanda Eco Camp. They participated in the One Foot Forward initiative, which created awareness for mental health in October. The wellbeing team planned an excursion to Tallebudgera creek that focused on mindfulness activities, like breath work, reflections and conversation circles.

Semester two has been an exciting time for Year 12, as well as a time for high emotions and anxiety around leaving school. The Year 12 staff are incredibly proud of the students and are excited for them to graduate as successful, caring, independent and respectful young adults.


Arcadia College now offers a wonderful Education Program via a different mode of delivery-Distance Education.
