YR 7 & 8 COORDIATOR Ev Sasin

The Year 7 & 8 students have worked very hard over the semester, engaging in a range of hands-on learning experiences, and teaching linked to real world concepts. In English, students engaged in narrative writing tasks and embedded Indigenous perspectives by reviewing the book titled the 'Honey Spot' written by Jack Davis. The students also explored the needs of young people by developing Youth Centres to cater to the diverse needs of youth in our community. Science has been full of investigations and exploring how scientific elements have affected the relationship between forces that are balanced and unbalanced. In ABL students, were fortunate to spend quality time at a local Aged Care facility, building positive relationships with our older generations by playing games, sharing stories and designing artworks with them. Students also engaged in nature walks within our local communities to make connections to land and place. Our cohort really enjoys and gets involved in our connections to significant days such as 'Are You Okay Day,' and 'Wear it Purple Day.' With the celebration and recognition of these vital aspects of young people's lives, our students are developing into caring young individuals by understanding diversity and inclusion.

The Year 8 students particularly enjoyed engaging in their Science lessons where they learned about the exciting world of rocks and fossils. They used mars bars, clay and crystals to study the rock cycle and how the earth was formed. In Art lessons students were provided with abundant opportunities to showcase their creativity. During English this semester, students conducted an investigation into the impact human activity has had on a chosen endangered species. They also wrote a short story, from the perspective of a worker in a developing country. In Geography, students studied landscapes and landforms, and how they were created. They also looked at the impact of humans on the environment with a focus on urbanisation, including learning about megacities. In History, students engaged in the world of Vikings and created their own artefacts to showcase to the school. There were also a selected number of students who wrote and illustrated their own books for the Kindergarten across from Arcadia College in our 'Write a Book in a Day' program.





YR 9 COORDINATOR

Term 3 was another successful and engaging term for our Year 9 students. It has been great to see our students achieving goals, facing their fears, challenging themselves and creating a community.

In Science, students learnt about chemical changes through a weekly experiment which ranged from growing crystals, making tangy sherbet, creating lava lamps and everyone's favourite; making slime!

In English, our Year 9 students learnt about the value of oral histories and established a partnership with Varsity Views Aged Care Residence. Our Year 9's spent time with the residents and interviewed them about their life and the lessons they could pass on to others. Some of our students were even asked back to volunteer their time at the weekend!

In Geography students learnt about Biomes and created their own 3D dioramas.

In Art, students explored street art and put their skills to work creating and designing their own hat.

One of the highlights of the term was being part of Space Camp! This was run by the organisation Convoy of Hope. Our students were transported into space through VR headsets, participated in robotics battles and even sent messages to the Space Station! This was a fantastic experience for all our students and provided them with an experience and opportunity they may never have again.













YR 10 COORDINATOR

The Year 10 students have been working extremely hard the past semester in all of their subject areas. Within English, students explored Utopian vs Dystopian societies as they analysed the text 'The Hunger Games.' Students scrutinised and commented on contemporary social issues in an attempt to answer the inquiry question 'Can a perfect world ever be achieved?'

In Maths, students were supported to solve problems involving linear equations and inequalities and make the connections between algebraic and graphical representations of relations.

Science saw students focusing on Physical and Chemical Sciences, as they explored the periodic table and varying rates of reaction. For their assessment, the students were required to design their own experiments to attempt to influence this chemical rate of reaction. The students loved being able to explore and experiment within this area.

In Business, students focused on marketing as they created a marketing portfolio that considered practical marketing and business skills to start a business.

The students who demonstrated the highest levels of effort in English and Maths were rewarded with an Excursion to The Club Mini Golf – Boulders and Badlands. Students loved the excursion and even commented that it was the best excursion they have been on! This definitely increased the students' levels of motivation toward their subject areas to be selected to attend.

Within the Elective subject of HPE, students have been studying modified games, including how the classification system works in the Paralympics. Students engaged on an excursion to Carrara Stadium to experience wheelchair basketball, as they were coached by players from the Gold Coast Rollerblaze Wheelchair Basketball.

Many of the students have also been engaging in Trades, Certificates and Traineeships, with 16 students engaging in some form of a career pathway this past Semester.

The students should be proud of their hard work and focus within this area, as they navigate this engagement while still maintaining their achievement with their academics and school work completion.

This semester Year 11 students engaged in various activities and lessons to support them to gain necessary skills and confidence to engage in the community and begin their transition to Year 12.

Year 11 students have been setting measurable goals and taking the steps to successfully reach these goals, whether it be academically, socially, emotionally, school related or personal. An initiative from Term 3, has been our Yarning Circle. This has been every Thursday, where students have had opportunities to share opinions and discuss topics in a respectful manner.



This past semester, the Duke of Edinburgh students have been extremely busy, as they have been working hard towards achieving their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. For the Service component of their Award, students have been engaging at Currumbin Community Special School, where they have been running lunch activities every week for two hours.

The students have been running basketball games, trampoline activities, engaging in Just Dance, colouring, and arts and craft activities. The students have loved engaging with the Currumbin students, building their own communication and social capacities.

For the Physical component of their Award, students have been completing Orienteering with increasing difficulties in the circuits. The students have developed strength in being able to read a map and a compass, navigate whilst in unfamiliar environments, and work effectively with different peers.

Students have been geographically embarrassed a few times within these activities but have always managed to use problem solving and their navigation skills to support themselves to find their next post. The students' Adventurous Journey in Term 3 saw them engage in a one-night camp at Springbrook National Park. The student's campsite was quite challenging, as they had no showers, hot water, and only a drop toilet to use.

The students excelled in this environment and showed high levels of adaptability and independence.

We have had a very busy year in Careers and Training in the Senior School for 2023.

We had students in Year 10 completing Tasters at TAFE. These Tasters are for Health, Cooking, Hospitality, Trades, Barista and Community Services. It's a great way for the students to get an insight into the industry and decide whether they would like to complete a qualification in that field. We had quite a few students sign up for the Certificate II qualification in the Taster they completed which is exactly what it's all about.

We have also seen an increase in our students taking on School Based Traineeships. This is a great way to 'earn while you learn' with the student attending the workplace minimum one day per week for paid work and also completing a qualification which is usually a Certificate III in Business depending on the industry. School Based Traineeship vacancies are sent out to the students emails every 3-4 weeks while in Year 10 and Year 11. If a student finds a business they would like to work in, they need to come and see me and I get the process started of applying for this position. The release day that the student attends their workplace is an approved release day and does not affect your students attendance percentage.

We have a new and exciting qualification being delivered at Arcadia next year. This will be the Certificate II in Cookery. We will have a Third Party Trainer (chef) coming in to deliver this qualification and we are lucky enough to be using the brand new Bond University commercial kitchen which is directly across the road. Students will learn all aspects of cooking and kitchen skills in this qualification and it would be a great qualification to have for future job prospects and life skills!

At this stage, this qualification has been opened up to Year 11 and Year 12 but if there is any room, it will be opened up to Year 10 students as well.

TAFE@School for Semester 1 2024 is closed for applications but they do have a few vacancies in certain classes. If your student is wishing to start a course in the beginning of 2024, please get in touch with me so that I can see if it is a possibility. TAFE will release courses for their Semester 2 intake approximately the end of Term 1 or beginning of Term 2. As soon as these are released, I will forward all information to families/carers and students.

Gold Coast Trade College will have courses starting in each term. These courses are in Plumbing, Electrotechnology, Construction and Automotive. They are based at Currumbin and have a wonderful supportive college. If you would like more information about these trade courses please get in touch with me.

Completing a qualification whether through TAFE/RTO or a traineeship is a great way to earn QCE points that go towards your students' Queensland Certificate of Education. Certificate 1 in Construction is worth 3 QCE points and all Certificate II's are worth 4 QCE points. If a student is completing a Certificate III or above, these are worth 8 QCE points. VETis funding will cover every student to complete either a Certificate I or II and if your student decides to complete a Certificate III or higher via TAFE there will be fees involved. If your student completes a Certificate III through a School Based Traineeship, this would be free of charge as it is different funding.

Completing qualifications via TAFE or School Based Traineeships also looks fantastic on a Resume as it shows commitment, responsibility and tenacity

UNI START PROGRAM

UniStart students have now completed the 15-week intensive course, ensuring direct entry into Southern Cross University. Students completed the course to an exceptionally high standard, with students Kyra H and Jasper E taking out first and second place overall.

There were 120 students completing the course state-wide and Arcadia students placed first, second and fourth. This year, SCU offered scholarship prizes for those students who placed first, second and third overall. As such, Kyra received a \$10,000 scholarship and Jasper a \$7,500 scholarship.

We are extremely proud of the hard-work and dedication of our 12 UniStart students, who have all gained direct entry into Southern Cross University for 2024.

Who doesn't need to apply / reapply?

- Students who currently have a bus pass for 2023 which do not fall into the above categories
- · Students without a bus pass not wishing to travel on the bus

SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING/THE RESILIENCE PROJECT AT ARCADIA COLLEGE

During Semester 2, the students have been looking at 'Empathy' and what it actually is and how to go about practising it. Attached are some ideas and explanations about empathy.



Parents & Carers

EMPATHY & KINDNESS

Working on empathy helps us to identify, understand and feel what another person is feeling. When we show empathy or we do something kind for someone else, our brain releases oxytocin. This leads to us increasing our self-esteem/confidence, energy levels, positivity and overall happiness.





Empathy has no script. There is no right way or wrong way to do it. It's simply listening, holding space, withholding judgment, emotionally connecting, and communicating that incredibly healing message of 'You're not alone'. - Brené Brown

You can practise empathy in a variety of ways. Below are some ideas you could have a go at doing with the family.

Kindness Walk

Head out for a walk and challenge the people you are walking with to see how many acts of kindness you can accumulate together while on your walk. Afterwards, discuss how it made you feel.

Support A Charity Or Organisation

Together as a family choose a charity or organisation you would like to support. This may be something you are passionate about or a cause you feel is in need.

- · Research the best way you can support this cause.
- · As a family, make a plan of what you are going to do.
- · Work together to support your charity or organisation.

Neighbourhood Kindness Challenge

This is a great way to show kindness and build connection with your neighbours:

- Offer to walk your neighbour's dog or go for a walk with them.
- · Take your neighbour's bins out or bring the bins in for them.
- Offer to do some gardening for them.
- · Cook or make a neighbour a meal or some treats.
- Write a little kindness note and place it in their letterbox.
- Make a gift and deliver it.
- Stop and have a chat with your neighbour and ask how their day is going.

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Listen Empathetically
