Euthanasia means 'a good death' and refers to a gentle, painless and assisted way of dying. The choice to end your pet's life is never an easy one. It can be very emotional, and often the guilt can be overwhelming. For an ethical veterinarian, it is only a choice when all else fails.

A debilitating disease, an accident, or if your pet is deteriorating to such a degree that their quality of life has been compromised are all factors that can force this difficult decision. Discussing this with your vet can guide you at this time. We can advise you of any other possible medical options that may help your pet to lead a life of dignity. We can also advise when, sadly, no more can be done and explain the process of euthanasia to you, so you understand your choice.

You will always remember your pet, but you may want to plant a tree at your home in honour of your friendship. Or, you may wish to scatter their ashes in a favourite place, commission a painting of your pet, or make a photo book from all the many photos that you have. They may be gone, but they will live on in your heart forever.




## supporting you through

## pet loss

Facing the loss of a beloved pet is an incredibly difficult experience, and the HIGHlands team is here to support you every step of the way. From compassionate guidance during the euthanasia process to offering meaningful ways to remember your cherished companion, we want to ensure that you and your pet receive the utmost care and respect. - There is a form that you need to fill out if you decide to go ahead with euthanasia. You can now fill this out in the privacy of your own home. The form is called 'Authority for Euthanasia' and is available on our website here.

### Transitioning a cat from an outdoor to an indoor lifestyle can be a challenging, but rewarding, journey.

While the great outdoors offers endless excitement and stimulation, the indoor environment can provide safety, comfort, and a longer lifespan for your feline friend.

An inside cat is safe from erratic traffic, encounters with toxic chemicals in garages on the street, and without the serious risk of injury or disease from other cats. With your cat inside, the local wildlife will also be safer.

If you decide to transition your outdoor cat to the life of an indoor cat, make the changes gradual.

#### Tips to Succeed

- Your cat will have to use a litter box full time now, so ensure it is always immaculate as cats are very clean animals.
- Feed your cat inside, but instead of letting them go back outside as soon as they are finished eating, keep them inside for an increasing amount of time to adjust.
- Ensure they have a bed or two in prime areas within your home. Cats love to sleep a lot.
- Tubs of cat grass will provide a tasty chew as well as provide some essential vitamins.
- Provide a scratching post or two so they don't use your furniture.

- Leave out some fun toys and play with your cat to help satisfy their stalking instinct.
- A pet indoor tree to climb, or a shelf by a window (closed, of course) that allows them to watch what is going on outside will be fun.
- A simple cardboard bag or perhaps a box with a 'window' will provide hours of fun.
  - Groom and brushing their coat will trigger their purr button as cats love being pampered.
  - Cats are active during the night. You may wake up to kitty thundering down the hall, attacking the pot plants, or keeping you awake. You can overcome this by playing

games before bed, leaving them a trail of tasty snacks to find, and toys for them to play with.

The younger the cat, the easier to transition from an outside cat to a pampered inside kitty.

Point to note – if you don't want something you love to be pushed off its shelf and smashed as your kitten watches on in awe, put all valuables away so that they can't be cathandled.

Finally, cats like their comfort, so they should adapt quickly to having their human fulfil their every need.

#### "Silent Suffering: Recognising and Managing Pain in Pets"

The usual giveaways to recognising pain in your pet are generally picked up via a behavioural change such as a grumpy demeanour, shaking, excessive licking or scratching, loss of appetite and perhaps limping. Usually, we are so tuned into our pet's feelings that we can pick up when they are not well.



In this useful talk, Dr Diederich outlined the typical symptoms of how your pet would react if they had a health issue. More importantly, he covered some great strategies when handling an animal in pain and how you can help them without hurting them or being hurt yourself.

Histiocytosis is a group of rare disorders in which too many histocytes (a type of white blood cell) build up within certain tissues and organs. Treatment depends on the severity of the disease, and where in the body it gets a hold.

But Edith keeps fighting... she is a champion and survivor against all odds. She endured all testing and treatments with grace and dignity. While we closely monitor her health, she continues to go on living her best life, purring and kneading biscuits like the true heroine that she is!





#### Lend a Hand to Helping Paws


