### *Course Overview*

#### **Aim**

An intensive 1.5 day program that focuses in some detail on the principles that define the legal relationship between the patient and the health care professional. Participants will increase their knowledge and understanding of how these principles are applied by civil, criminal and disciplinary law in the context of clinical practice, thereby providing an opportunity to further enhance the health and safety of patients.

#### **Learning Outcomes**

1. Apply the principles of consent to, and refusal of, medical treatment in adults and children in the clinical setting.
2. Analyse the various categories of a doctor's duty of care that can be owed to a patient and the relationship between the duty, breach of duty and harm caused by the breach.
3. Differentiate between the cases of negligence that involve a failure to warn the patient of a material risk and those cases that involve treatment.
4. Recognise that the fundamental principle underpinning disciplinary law in relation to the regulation of health professionals is protection of the public, not punishment.
5. Differentiate between the common law and guardianship legislation regarding advance health directives and the withdrawal of life sustaining measures in patients with impaired capacity.

#### **About the Course**

Each presentation is followed by small group discussion of clinical case studies that relate to the subject material. The small groups each then report back the whole group, identifying the legal issues that were involved in the clinical situation presented.

#### **Pre-requisite**

The [ACLM Law Intensive 1](#) is generally a prerequisite to the Law Intensive 2 course. However, if you have completed other studies in medical law, please contact us to ascertain whether you can attend the Law Intensive 2 without having attended the Law Intensive 1.

### *Teaching Faculty*



#### *Professor John Devereux – Professor of Law, University of Queensland*

John Devereux teaches and researches the law of torts at the UQ Law School. He has a special interest in medical law, most notably in the areas of competency to consent to medical treatment and in epilepsy and the law. A Rhodes Scholar, John has worked as a lawyer in a variety of contexts including as a Barrister, as a consultant to a multi-national law firm, a Law Reform Commissioner for Queensland, a legal member of the Social Security Appeals Tribunal and as a Defence Force Magistrate. John was formerly Lecturer in Law at Keble College, Oxford University and Assistant Dean of Magdalen College, Oxford University. He is a former Associate Vice Chancellor of A.C.U. John is an Honorary Fellow of the Australasian College of Legal Medicine and joint Head of Teaching Faculty.



#### *Professor Roy Beran – Neurologist & Professor*

Roy G. Beran is a consultant neurologist and accredited sleep physician. His qualifications include: MBBS, MD, FRACP, FRACGP, Grad. Dip. Tertiary Ed., Grad. Dip. Further Ed., FAFPHM, FACLM, FRCP(Edin), FAAN, FANZAN, FACBS, B Leg. S, MHL and FFFLM (Hon). He is a Conjoint Professor of Medicine at the University of NSW; Professor in the School of Medicine at Griffith University, Queensland; Conjoint Professor, Medical School, Western Sydney University; and Professor, Chair, Sechenov Moscow 1st State University, Moscow, Russia. Following Russia's invasion of Ukraine, he refused to re-sign with Sechenov University. He is: a founding Fellow of the Australasian College of Legal Medicine (ACLM); Past President thereof, stepped down in 2011, still on Council and awarded Honorary Life Fellowship. In 2019, he was appointed 'Joint Head of Teaching Faculty'. He is the Australian Governor and was President of the World Association for Medical Law (WAML) in 2022, having previously been Secretary General, Executive Vice President and Regional Vice President. He was the first Honorary Fellow of the Faculty of Forensic & Legal Medicine of the Royal College of Physicians (London). He has published: almost 400 papers, book chapters and letters to the editor; presented in excess of 430 papers at national and international meetings; written or edited 17 books; serves on numerous editorial boards; and is the editor in chief of the international journal, *Medicine and Law*, the official journal of the WAML.



#### *Dr Adam Griffin – Senior Forensic Physician*

Dr Adam Griffin has been a medical practitioner for 28 years, Forensic Physician for 14 years and Statewide Director of Queensland's Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit for 10 years. He received a medical degree from the University of Queensland and a Masters in Forensic Medicine from Monash University. Adam is a Fellow and Censor in Chief of the Australasian College of Legal Medicine, Council member since 2009, and past-President from 2019-2024. Adam is also a foundation member of the Australasian Association of Forensic Physicians, and member of the Forensic and Clinical Toxicology Association. Adam enjoys study and research, educating others, playing tennis, recreational pursuits in IT and travel.
