FROM THE **PRINCIPAL**

Dear College Community

With the Intercol weekend upon us, I took the opportunity to address students earlier this week about the College's expectations.

Our Intercol fixtures against Sacred Heart represent one of the great schoolboy sporting rivalries in Adelaide, but they are always played in the right spirit. It is a willing and at times fierce contest, but respect for the opposition is a hallmark of these matches.

Going into a contest, self-belief is a crucial ingredient. I was so impressed with the thrilling ANZ Netball Grand Final on Sunday which was teetering on the brink until the Firebirds got up in double extra time. In a post-match interview with the Queensland Captain Laura Geitz, a reporter asked whether they always believe they could win. The Captain's reply was simple, 'At this level you just have to believe. If you doubt yourself then you're gone.'

As I told students, 'If you believe, then you can achieve.'

Far more important than the result on the scoreboard is how we play the game. No doubt, we will win some and we will lose some and in a few years' time no-one will remember the scores. But our conduct on and off the field will be remembered. The Rostrevor legacy is sportsmanship and respect for our opponent. We play hard but fair. We win humbly and we lose graciously.

I encouraged all students to be great hosts: to wear their formal uniform with pride; to cheer positively; to respect the officials; and to respect their opponents. In doing so we will be continuing the legacy that has made us one of the most respected and admired schools in Adelaide.

I also implored our students to let that school spirit and pride flow over into how they conducted themselves each day at Rostrevor. Whether it is our conduct in the classroom, or our care for the grounds or how we conduct ourselves travelling to and from school, Rostrevor pride is a daily commitment.

The spirit we show at Intercol is far more than a one off event. It is a daily commitment made by our young gentlemen that will continue to shape the Rostrevor culture and continue the legacy of respect and self-discipline for the next generation of students.

ThinkUKnow Australia is a cyber-safety education program that educates parents, carers and teachers of how people are using technology, the challenges they may face online, and how to help them overcome these in a safe and ethical way.

ThinkUKnow Australia is a partnership between the Australian Federal Police, Microsoft Australia, Datacom and the Commonwealth Bank. The program is delivered in collaboration with policing partners New South Wales Police Force, Northern Territory Police, Queensland Police, South Australia Police, Tasmania Police, Western Australia Police, as well as Neighbourhood Watch Australasia.

The 90 minute presentation will be delivered by a local law enforcement member and an industry volunteer. The presentation covers issues relating to children and young peoples' privacy and security online, their relationships with other users and their online reputation. It provides insight into the devices young people are using, as well as the popular websites, apps and social networking sites they're accessing.

This is a fantastic opportunity for you to learn more about young people and the online environment, and how you can help them to be safe and responsible users of technology.

Welcome back

I hope that families have settled back in to school routines.

We have 'hit the ground running' with Year 12 Mid-Year Exams and Year 11 Retreats in the first week of school and this week commenced with a Spirit Assembly organised by the Prefects in preparation for the Intercol weekend, Subject Selection Assemblies, commencement of dancing lessons for some of our Year 10 students and our Career Expo last night. While it has been busy, it has been a very positive start to the term and we hope that the energy and enthusiasm with which students have commenced the term does not dissipate as the term progresses.

Report Reflections

At the commencement of each term, students in Years 7 – 12 work with their Pastoral Care teacher to review and reflect upon the academic results they achieved at the end of the previous term. This reflection should also involve a detailed conversation at home where your son will hopefully be honest in his assessment of not only his semester grades, but more importantly, his attitude to study, homework and behaviour in class.

Students, their families and our staff need to work together to make sure that the goals set are achievable and that all avenues for success are explored. Students must set themselves challenges, however, at the same time they must be undertaking courses that are best suited to their interests, abilities and stages of development. The role of the Pastoral Care teacher is also very important in this process, as they too share the responsibility of working with students to monitor this overall real-life development plan.

This semester, most students will be undertaking a number of new subjects. This fresh start is another opportunity to turn over a new leaf, if required, or to continue to develop a more thorough understanding of subjects they are undertaking with respect to future career choices. This is obviously very important in the senior years.

Prefect Selection Process

Last week Simon Dash and I met with our current Year 11 cohort to run through the Prefect Application process for 2017. All students were issued with the Application Package, which includes instructions, the Application Form and two Teacher Endorsement Forms.

The 2017 Prefect structure will be the same as this year. There will be six non-House Portfolio positions, including the Head Prefect and Deputy Head Prefect, Prefect – Head of Boarding, Prefect Social Justice Captain, Prefect – Community Activities and Prefect – Internal Services. There will also be an additional six Prefect roles associated with each of our six Houses, namely Prefect – House Captain.

We have developed Position Information Documents (PIDs) for each Prefect position which outlines in some detail the duties, responsibilities and expectations we have of students who may be interested in such a role. These have been made available via a Virtual Workspace which all Year 11 students have access to via the Student Portal. A detailed flowchart and timeline outlining the process is also available.

We hope that members of our Year 11 cohort, who have already served in some leadership capacity within one or more of our pillars (Academic, Spiritual & Co-Curricular) or have leadership aspirations, will give thorough consideration to applying for a 2017 Prefect position.

Pathways to Post Secondary Program and Service Learning

In the last week of Term 2, our Years 10 and 11 students were involved in our Pathways to Post-Secondary Program and Service Learning, respectively. The feedback received so far from members of our community and external organisations with regard to student engagement and demeanour has been very positive. Students represented themselves, their families and the College extremely well.

The Pathways to Post-Secondary Program provided students with the opportunity to be exposed to a range of work, career and tertiary pathways and opportunities. This was well situated in terms of timing as we begin the subject selection process this term. An enormous amount of work went into planning and preparing the program and we must thank Chris Windle and other College staff who assisted with supervision or delivery of sessions.

With respect to our Year 11 students out on Service Learning, we also had many reports back from providers, indicating that our young men were not only well-mannered and efficient but immersed in the selfless giving aspects to their work. We believe this is one of the most important lessons we can provide in life for our students – that life is not all about them and that it is through the giving of ourselves to others that we start to develop an understanding of the real purpose of our lives.

Intercol Weekend

This weekend is our customary Sporting Intercol. Our annual clash with Sacred Heart College is one of the many traditional celebrations we look forward to at Rostrevor and wish all teams the best of luck in their respective sports.

National Youth Science Forum

Congratulations to **Thomas Roocke** who has been successful with his application to attend the National Science Forum (NYSF) in Canberra in January 2017. This event brings 400 young people to Canberra for a 12-day immersive science experience. The application process was rigorous and we believe that Thomas is one of only 10 who were successful from South Australia.

The NYSF helps students who wish to follow careers in science, engineering and technology by introducing them to research and researchers, by encouraging the achievement of excellence in all their undertakings, and by helping to develop their communication and interpersonal skills. It also fosters discussion of, and interest in major national and global issues and emphasises the importance of maintaining continuing active interests in sport, arts and music.

I have no doubt that Thomas will enjoy the experience.



One clear piece of evidence from around the world currently suggests that all children benefit incredibly from social and emotional learning - academically, socially, emotionally, spiritually and behaviourally. This is indeed a challenge in the fast paced world we live in today.

To that end we will be launching, as part of the College's 'Blue Week' next week, a very special program based on building and developing resilience amongst our boys.



Both sides played with a strong defensive set up which made the game regularly rebound from end to end.

Rostrevor had a strong middle period of the first quarter where we had momentum but failed to make the most of this by regularly kicking to the opposition numbers in our front half. In the

second quarter, PAC started well and got out to an early lead before our boys showed some real character and fought back late in the term to kick a couple and go into the half time break with a small 4 point lead.

After the break Rostrevor built strong momentum in the 3rd quarter but again through poor foot skills and decision making going forward, repeatedly turned the ball over. The defensive aspect of our game was really positive restricting PAC to only 2 scoring shots for the quarter and keeping them to only 3 goals up to 3 quarter time

The pattern of this game was following the script of the first clash earlier in the year and with light rain making conditions more difficult, the last quarter was going to go down to the wire. Like the previous game, PAC held dominance in the last quarter and we again had to defend our back half. We battled on manfully, repeatedly repelling the ball from our defence only to see it come back in again just as quickly. With 3 minutes to go PAC with the momentum hit the lead. Our boys again lifted in a desperate bid to produce an attacking play effective enough to get a score late in the quarter. Unfortunately we were unable to do this with the final script ending up showing us falling short by 6 points. In the end, PAC's better usage of the ball, our inability to establish a functioning forward line and our boys' lack of consistency throughout the game were the major factors towards the result.

It was very difficult to find better players across the 4 quarters as most of our players all had good moments and most had even battles against their direct opponents. Consistency across the 4 quarters was an issue for all our players.

Kavier Cubillo was one player through the midfield who put his body consistently on the line and won his position well on the day.

Junior Grant (First game on return from injury), Guy Hutchison and Josh Richards all had strong moments through the midfield as well.

Toby Pink had a good battle in Ruck against a good opponent. Our Backline held up well all game with Mihail Lochowiak and Lewis

McCormack having good battles against the opposition key forwards. Up forward we struggled to find a dominant player despite the boys battling hard.

We can be all really proud of the boys' attitude and effort. They never gave the game away at any stage and fought to the final siren. With a little more polish and consistency within their game, their hard work will be eventually rewarded.
