Dear St Mary's College

During the recent Junior School musical Madagascar, I had the opportunity to spend time with the main cast of characters before each show. Right before sound check, Mandy Hancock-Varga, the show's Director, would gather the cast in a circle and invite a personal reflection on the experience of being in the show. Each reflection circle had a different focus.

In one circle, the girls were asked to share something they had learnt from being part of the musical. Their reflections were profound insights for young people. It struck me that in different ways, they each reflected on things that many of us will spend a whole lifetime learning over and over again. I share some of their input here:



Year 6 Wisdom

- Some parts will look more interesting than others, but you can make something from every part, no matter how small it is. It is important to get over disappointment and give it your best.
- It's hard to imagine early on that the show will come together, it is messy and then one day it is not.
- It's okay to make a mistake; it often helps you to make things better.
- You can do much more than you ever imagined possible when you just give something a go.
- Getting on stage in front of an audience is not as scary as it seems, and it feels good when you can try.
- Go into things with a positive mind and you will do better.
- Even if you make a mistake the audience will never know; they haven't seen the script!
- The role you are given does not mean you are better than someone else. Our roles are chosen to match our character and personality; the role is right for the person.
- It's not important to get every tiny detail perfect. What is important is to have fun, to learn and to enjoy the experience.
- We are lucky at St Mary's to have so many great opportunities to try new things and extend ourselves.

The Junior School production, and the wisdom it generated, is one of the reasons we always talk about learning both in and beyond the classroom. Across the months that go into preparation for something as big and wonderful as Madagascar, there were lots of moments of joy, fun, and learning. A production takes a whole community investment, and this was evident in the number of staff, parents, grandparents and friends who joined in to help...some of whom are not even part of the Junior School community anymore but who love the experience.



We look forward to our Middle and Senior years students having this opportunity in 2022.

They embraced the unique experience of Adnyamathanha culture, visited various sites of ancient significance, and heard stories from Adnyamathanha people who are the custodians of the land.


Cliff Coulthard, the chief elder in the Coulthard family, led them on a social history tour. They learnt about life before contact with white people, and following this, the massive changes to their lives and culture. It was very hard listening to this history; there was much compassion and empathy for our First Nations people.

Our travellers also headed to the Ochre Pit, where Terrence Coulthard shared the significance of ochre to their culture and all First Nations peoples. They then participated in an ochre ceremony, where Terrence marked them with five ochre colours; connected them to the spirits, new beginnings, Mother Earth, breathing, and cleansing. Students and staff were all very grateful for sharing this experience and will carry this into their future.



Our students were wonderful ambassadors for our College and this experience has opened up future opportunities to partner with Iga Warta, in a variety of ways.




These Sacramental times of retreat and ceremony give us pause to open our hearts to God so that we may experience the freely given grace and love of God.

To uphold the seasonal tradition of neighbourly kindness, 28 music students are heading to Kangaroo Island from Friday 3 December to Thursday 9 December for a different take on a Music immersion experience.

Two years after the Black Summer bushfires and after another year entrenched in pandemic-related uncertainty, the College decided to share its passion for music closer to home. Normally, students would have been preparing to travel to Ireland to reconnect with Cabra College, Dublin - the home of seven of the original Dominican Sisters at St Mary's - however this wasn't possible due to COVID restrictions.

Instead, the students will showcase their diverse musical talents with locals on a different island. From choirs to instrumental ensembles encompassing traditional through to jazz and contemporary music, the 2021 Music Tour aims to be as much about service as performance, delivering Christmas joy in a series of events.

Students will perform at the Carols Community Event at Lloyd Collins Reserve in Penneshaw, the Penneshaw Markets, and at the Kingscote, Penneshaw and Parndana campus of Kangaroo Island Community Education.

Once Upon A Time Festival

Last Thursday, my English class (8 Blue) attended the Once Upon A Festival at Immanuel College. Several authors spoke about their novels and answered questions from students from all around Adelaide. They spoke about how they got started as writers, how they find inspiration to write, and about their daily experiences and opportunities as writers. Our class was lucky enough to listen to Australian writer Tristan Bancks.

Tristan talked about his four books: Detention, The Fall, Two Wolves, and Ginger Meggs. He explained the importance of these books having uniformity in terms of font, colour and composition so that they look like they could be part of a series even though they are individual stories. He also talked about his great uncle's book, Ginger Meggs, and how the book was written and published 100 years ago but this year as it was its 100th year anniversary he gave the presentation of the Ginger Meggs book a modern overhaul with colour pictures throughout. Tristan Bancks explained how he is inspired by his surroundings when creating his books which includes images, articles, artifacts/objects, people, movies, stories from Australia, and the names and personalities of people he knows.

His discussion was interesting because it was a new experience and a fun place to visit. Attending Immanuel College was enjoyable because we got to interact with other schools and be in a setting that was different from our own. I wish he could have been present in person to make the experience more immersive and participatory; maybe next time when Covid restrictions are lifted. My favourite part was viewing his book trailers, which were entertaining to watch, accurate, and a realistic portrayal of his novels which we read in class. I also learnt some helpful writing strategies that will help

me out when I'm writing.

We all gained an important experience at Immanuel College, and we are now better-informed writers as a result.
