# From the Principal

Dear Parents and Carers,

The South Australian Commission for Catholic Schools (SACCS) has recently circulated a draft Student Inclusion and Diversity Policy for input from school communities. Alongside the draft policy is a document that captures the "policy into practice" approach.



The Policy is based on six interdependent strands that define Catholic Education's commitment to student inclusion and diversity:

- culture of inclusion;
- student agency;
- partnership with parents, carers, and families;
- focus on learning and wellbeing;
- leaders and staff focus on each student; and
- services for student learning, wellbeing and inclusion.

The following Strategies arise from the Student Inclusion and Diversity Policy:

- Disability Strategy;
- English as an Additional Language or Dialect Strategy;
- Aboriginal Education Strategy;
- Gifted Strategy;
- Engagement of Children and Young People in Care Strategy;
- Regional and Rural Strategy;
- Early Years Strategy;
- Vocational Education and Transition Strategy.

The following Procedures and Guidelines are derived from the Student Inclusion and Diversity Policy:

- Developing Responsible Student Behaviour: Guidelines;
- · Responding to Harassment and Bullying: Procedures;
- Parent Engagement: Guidelines;
- Student Enrolment: Procedures:
- Student Transition: Procedure.

The development of the project is grounded in engagement with, and feedback from, key stakeholders. This includes school governance, staff, students, parents and carers. 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### From the Deputy Principal

#### Safeguarding Sunday and National Child Protection Week

Safeguarding Sunday is on 12 September and was formerly known as Child Protection Sunday. The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference sees Safeguarding Sunday as a day which seeks to acknowledge the immense damage caused by the sexual abuse of children and adults at risk, including by priests, religious and lay people within Catholic contexts.

There is a focus on raising awareness of child protection in the context of all types of harm and promoting safeguarding policies and procedures.

Safeguarding Sunday is an opportunity to celebrate children in the life of our parishes and schools, recognise that they are valued, respected, heard and encourage opportunities for children to be involved.

Safeguarding Sunday comes at the end of National Child Protection Week (5-11 September).

The theme adopted this year for <u>Child Protection Week</u> is "Every child, in every community, needs a fair go". This term, with the support of our wonderful SRCs, I gathered feedback from our student body about feeling safe at St Mary's - do they feel safe? Where and how do they feel safe and unsafe? And.....what else do we as a school need to be doing so students feel safe? This feedback will be used to shape further our safeguarding practices.

The 'Keeping them Safe: Child Protection Curriculum' is taught across the school to all students, from Reception – Year 12. The aim of this curriculum is to teach students about how to protect themselves, how to seek out help, what abuse looks like and feels like, and so forth. All staff who deliver this curriculum are fully trained to do so.

All staff this year are updating their training in responding to abuse and neglect in children, so they are fully aware of the processes to follow in regards to mandatory reporting. If staff suspect a child/young person is being abused or neglected in some way, or in cases where this information is disclosed directly to them, they are legally mandated to report this information and follow up on it.

St Mary's College takes very seriously the safeguarding of all children in our care. In my last newsletter article, I outlined the updated processes for all parents who would like to become volunteers at our school. Similar processes are also in place for all visiting speakers/groups/student

teachers/contractors, and so forth, who come on to our grounds and work with students.

Parents and Carers are also reminded that at least one term's notice of termination of enrolment must be given for any withdrawal of place. Failure to do so will mean payment of a term's fees in lieu of notice irrespective of the date the child leaves during the term. #### **Uniform Policy Update**

Over the last 18 months we have worked with a number of our College stakeholders to revise and update our Uniform Policy. Our College uniform is an outward reflection of our identity as a community. Individual actions affect the image of the College and perceptions of others. The correct presentation of the school uniform is a shared responsibility between home and school and all members of the community are responsible for supporting our young people to comply with the policy.

Here are a few important reminders:

- Nails: students nails are not to have coloured sns, shellac and acrylic. Only clear nails are allowed; they must be no longer than the tips of the fingers.
- Jewellery: a moderate approach to jewellery that is in keeping with the school uniform is appropriate. This includes a single plain ring, small cross/religious medallion and small, thin, sleepers or studs. No visible facial piercings.
- PE Uniform: the PE uniform is only worn for the school day when students have PE lessons. When they have before and after school training students are required to change.
- Hair: Hair needs to be natural colours. Hair that is shoulder length or longer needs be away from the face.

We are a community that is built on relationships and dialogue and therefore from time to time we need to take student particular needs into consideration. We want to work with you and your child about how we can support them to be in correct uniform. If there are needs we need to take into consideration about your child and how they wear their uniform, please contact your child's Care Group Teacher.

## Online Safety

#### Do you know the following facts:

- On average, children aged 10 to 14 years have 2 active social media accounts
- On average, outside of school, 10 to 14 year olds spend 23 hours online per week
- 12% of 10 to 14 year olds share personal information online
- 9% of 10 to 14 year olds reported being exposed to inappropriate content
- 21% of 10 to 14 year olds reported being socially excluded by others online (one form of cyberbullying)
- 36% of 10 to 14 year olds said they had talked to strangers online

\*The above facts come from the 2017 Youth Digital Participation Survey – A nationally representative sample of 3017 children and youth (8 – 17 years).

Are you surprised about the above statistics? Do you want to know more about how you can help your daughter if she experiences any of the above scenarios? The Office of the eSafety Commissioner has just released a 10 minute online interactive tour for parents. The interactive tour provides tips on how you can help your daughter explore the online world and mange online issues should they arise. This is especially important as they strive for independence and peer acceptance. Topics covered are: cyberbullying, screen time, social media, personal information, inappropriate contact etc. Parents can select any topic that they are interested in to get started and close the tour at any time, resuming from where they left off the next time they access the tour.

#### Traffic Safety

I would like to communicate some important reminders and requests regarding traffic safety and awareness. Observations and parental feedback have indicated some dangerous driving behaviours which compromise student and community safety particularly in Franklin Street at the beginning and end of the day.

We ask that all community members follow the simple manageable requests below which are based on traffic safety guidelines from Adelaide City Council and the need to prioritise community safety over individual need.

**PLEASE** do not park your vehicle in the Drop Off/Pick Up Zone adjacent to the main gates between 8.00 and 9.00 am and 3.00 and 4.00 pm.

- You must not stop in a NO STOPPING Zone, even for a few seconds to pick up your child.
- You may stop in a NO PARKING ZONE for a few seconds to pick up a child who is waiting nearby. You must not park or leave the vehicle.

**PLEASE** do not double park on the outside of parked vehicles – this is dangerous and blocks the bike lane.

PLEASE consider delaying your arrival to collect your daughter at the end of the day by 5/10 minutes.

**PLEASE** understand that it is not possible for all parents to collect their daughters at 3.15 pm outside the main gate.

PLEASE drive around the block if necessary.

**PLEASE** consider parking a little further away and allowing yourself/your daughter to walk.

**PLEASE** model responsible behaviour by always using the pedestrian crossing to cross Franklin Street.
