From the Principal

Dear St Mary's College

Last week, we farewelled our 2021 Year 12 cohort. In this newsletter I have shared two speeches from the final assembly – mine and the College Captains.

To our Year 12 cohort of 2021, you are close to the end of a significant section of your lives – the "schooling years." Most of you started school in the year 2009. Back in 2009:

- Kevin Rudd was Prime Minister of Australia, Mike Rann was Premier of our State.
- There were devastating bushfires in Victoria
- The Federal Government released a second financial stimulus package to ward off the impacts of the global financial crisis
- Anna Bligh became Australia's first female elected Premier Kristina Keneally followed later that year though
 not as an elected Premier
- The first case of swine flu was diagnosed
- Madagascar, Monsters, Toy Story and Ice Age all had box office releases
- Barack Obama was sworn in as the 44th President of the United States
- Michael Jackson died
- The long-standing feud between Taylor Swift and Kanye West began when he interrupted her Emmy's acceptance speech (apparently, they are still fighting)
- You began school during a 1 in 100-year heat wave. South Australia also recorded the hottest November ever in that year

In 2009, St Mary's College celebrated 140 years

- Eileen Young was Principal of the College, and in 2017 when many of you started in Year 8 Mrs Young passed the baton to me
- Those of you who began here in Reception, had Miss Shattock as your teacher.
- Ms Davies also began at St Mary's in 2009

Throughout the passage of time, many things change, but threads of the familiar remain. I was struck by how many familiar threads there are from the year 2009 to now – I wonder if you noticed them? Whether you have been with us since 2009 or joined us along the way, your time as students of St Mary's is woven into the fabric of the school. You have left your mark here. The thread of the story also continues with you as you go; you take something of us with you.

Each year, since 1998, the College has had a theme to help us explore our Dominican Charism and Gospel mission with a particular focus. The themes since 2009 give you quite a sound list of good advice to send you on your way:

- Listening with your full attention is the most important gift you can give another person. As humans we are getting worse at it. It is a skill worth cultivating
- Care for our earth
- Dare to see what is happening around you in other words, don't be completely self-absorbed
- Embrace change with joy you'll have a happier life
- Be your best self set the world on fire
- Live in the moment, be hopeful
- Being Dominican means, we are sent to proclaim the Gospel irrespective of your personal religious belief, live
 with care for others, remember everything we have taught you about justice, and speak out when you witness
 injustice
- Be truthful see into the heart of things, to understand what is really going on, and stretch yourselves through dialogue. Don't just talk to people who think the same as you do

Uniform

For those families who have been with us for a few years, you would be aware that there has been a transition process between the previous uniform (with colours gold, blue and white) to our current 'new' uniform. Next year is the last year of the transition, and therefore, it is anticipated and presumed that all students will have the new summer and winter, and PE uniform, by the end of next year. Currently, there are a few students who have the new summer/winter uniform, but are still wearing the old PE uniform, often because they're wearing older sisters' or cousins' uniform. RAN Training

A new Responding to Abuse and Neglect Training is now available, and all staff and volunteers in schools are required to update their training by 31 December 2021.

The course is now called: Responding to Risks of Harm, Abuse and Neglect - Education and Care (RRHAN-EC). The online course takes approximately two hours to complete online, if you have already completed the original seven-hour course.

If you are a new volunteer (or about to become a new volunteer), you will need to complete a four hour Masterclass Workshop (in-person or via Zoom with a trainer) first, and then complete the two hour online course. Building Resilience

On a completely different note, Audrey Tang has just released a new book The Leader's Guide to Resilience: How to Use Soft Skills to Get Hard Results, where she outlines six big ideas about building resilience, both in teams and individually:

- Build Strength find your own definition of resilience, and this will help you build the strength you need. This will also help you recognise the strength in others.
- Courageous Teams build a team with the qualities you want, and to do this, you need to have these qualities yourself.
- 3. Harness Drive micromanaging should be avoided. You need to walk a fine line between keeping others motivated and letting them do the job themselves. Give others room to shine and assure them you have faith in them, and they will find their passion and shine.
- Authenticity when you bring your authentic self to a situation or team, others around you will be more inspired to work with you.
- Sustainability resilience means being sustainable and able to continue for an indefinite period.
- Confidence and Future Planning the key to resilience during tough times (like a pandemic) is preparation as well as fortitude. Building a confident mindset within those around you helps your confidence in knowing you can get through hard times.

These six 'big ideas' outlined by Tang apply equally to the work we



undertake with children and young people, both as parents and educators ... building and developing their resilience so they are prepared and ready to handle everything that comes along in their life.

This item combined Concert Band and Concert Choir in an African flavoured piece sung in Swahili, which was not only a big project musically but also logistically! Our Year 6 cohort worked all year to be a part of the large Festival Choir also on the final night, with Maddie T representing St Mary's College singing the National Anthem. Well done to all students and staff for a great final week which was capped off with all of the student rock bands performing on the last day of term for Justice Day!



Science Week

Last term, the theme for Science Week, Food: Different by Design, encouraged a collaboration between Science and Food Technology at St Mary's College. Students explored the scientific background of the preparation of a variety of food including ice cream and honeycomb.

Year 12 students were treated to a morning tea of cupcakes arranged in the design of the Periodic Table. Each student's name was used in place of the elements - created using the edible icing printer.

Mrs Alicia Hancock ran a session to demonstrate the technique of cooking honeycomb. Alongside Mrs Hancock, our STEM captains, Chloe S and Alex W performed dry ice experiments to demonstrate the properties of the carbon dioxide produced in the process.

Year 11 Food and Hospitality students challenged Year 11 Science students to a "Bake-Off" using a recipe designed by two Google Cloud engineers using machine learning. The recipe was for a new type of treat, the "cakie" – half cake and half cookie.



Science Week ended with a display of some spectacular demonstrations! Thanks to Mrs Hancock and the Food and Hospitality team for their support of these events.

Preparing today's learners for uncertainty – a webinar for parents






