In this edition of the Blue and Blue there's a focus on the opening and blessing of the Br Joseph McAteer Centre. Such is the present pace of life at Sacred Heart that the next project is well underway in regards to Champagnat Campus, Mitchell Park!

The McAteer Centre is a wonderful communal, teaching and learning and sports facility which will serve the College well for decades to come. Already this winter the Old Collegians Netballers and Footballers have enjoyed access to the Centre. Included in the building is a Hall of Honour which recognises some outstanding Sacred Heart Old Collegians. The initial inductees are also depicted in a following article.

However, this is just the start of the process! You are encouraged to nominate SHOCs for recognition and each year at the celebration of the Feast of St Marcellin Champagnat, a number of SHOCs, who have achieved recognition in their field of pursuit at a national and international level, and maintained a fond connection to

Finally, I'd like to draw your attention to the Marist Association of St Marcellin Champagnat ([www.maristassociation.org.au](http://www.maristassociation.org.au)). The Association is a genuine response to a call for co-responsibility for the life and mission of the wider

Australian Marist Community. It will provide a formal Church structure for leadership and governance of Marist ministries into the future. In many ways it formalises what already exists to better provide for Marist life and ministry. Marcellin Champagnat's particular gift was to found the Marist Brothers to teach and evangelise young people, particularly those on the margins of society.

The Marist Association aims to provide the necessary structure to keep Marcellin's dream alive! It is a body of people, canonically recognised in the Catholic Church, who share responsibility for the leadership, governance and animation of Marist ministries. The four main Marist ministries are schools (Marist Schools Australia), youth ministry (Marist Youth Ministry), youth care (Marist Youth Care) and solidarity (Marist Solidarity).

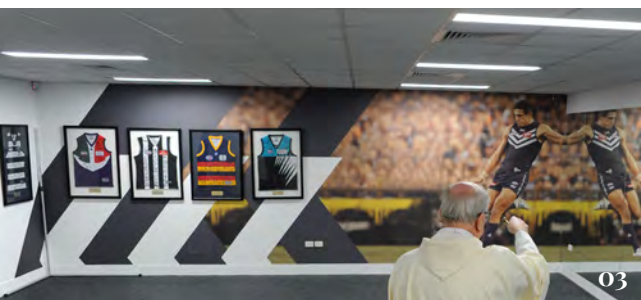

# School News

## Hall of Honour & Official Opening

The Hall of Honour was launched at the Opening and Blessing of the Brother Joseph McAteer Centre on Wednesday, 17 May 2017. For the first time all students from both campuses gathered together on school grounds. They were joined by a number of distinguished guests and friends of the College.

The Mass was celebrated by Most Reverend Archbishop Philip Wilson and Con-celebrated by Emeritus Archbishop Leonard Faulkner, Monsignor Ian Dempsey, Monsignor Rob Egar and Fr Peter Sheedy.

As well as the Opening and Blessing of our wonderful new learning and conference space, Archbishop Wilson gave a blessing to 12 members (or family representatives) of the inaugural inductees of the Hall of Honour who

were presented to the community.

The Hall of Honour recognises the wide-range of achievements of our Old Collegians through multiple disciplines such as Religion; Academia; Law; Entertainment; Medicine; Business and Commerce; Politics; Armed Services; Sport and Contribution to community, and particularly outstanding service to the Sacred Heart community. The inaugural inductees, for the most part, reflect the achievements of Old Collegians in the first 80 years of the College's history. The Hall of Honour currently features 21 names of distinguished alumni.

Future inductees in the Hall of Honour will reflect the achievements of our more recent alumni, as the school transitioned into a co-educational

College in the 1970s, with other Old Scholars being chosen for display over time. Amongst the next group of inductees will be some distinguished female Old Scholars. As other names are added, a selected number will be removed and added to a permanent honour board.

Br Peter Carroll, Provincial of the Marist Province of Australia, spoke about Br Joseph's contribution to the College as Principal between 1916 and 1924 before Brother Jordan Redden unveiled the plaque that was blessed by His Grace, Archbishop Wilson.

The Sports Conditioning room of the Brother Joseph McAteer Centre features two magnificent murals of Old Scholars, Matthew Pavlich ('99) and Maddy Proud ('11).

# Hall of Honour Inductees



**Rob Chapman**  
Attended SHC 1976-1980

Rob is the former Managing Director of Bank SA and Chief Executive of St George Bank, and is considered one of the state's most influential business leaders. He currently serves as Chairman of the Adelaide Football Club and Chairman of the Adelaide Airport, and is a member of the Premier's Economic Development Cabinet (*pictured with his wife, Lisa*).



The late **Bart Cummings**  
Attended SHC 1941-1942

The inaugural member of the Australian Racing Hall of Fame, Bart is the undisputed icon of the Australian Racing industry, the "Cup King" claiming 12 Melbourne Cups.



**Bill Denny**  
Attended SHC 1958-1965

Upon leaving school, Bill joined the Army and over 21 years, served in South Vietnam and PNG, as ADC (Aide de Camp) to the Governor General and on exchange duty with the British Army in Germany. Leaving the Army in 1990 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, Bill was made a member of the Order of Australia in 2006 for service to the community, particularly veterans and their families (*pictured with his family*).



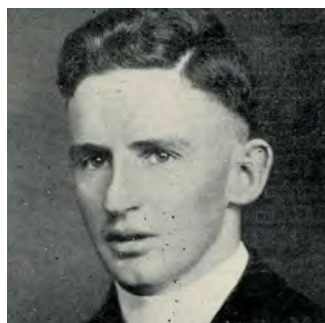
**Leonard Faulkner**  
Attended SHC 1940-1941

Leonard was ordained a priest in Rome on the first day of 1950. He was later appointed as the 17th Archbishop of Adelaide in 1985. Archbishop Faulkner was renowned for his work with migrant and refugee communities and his support of children and adults with disabilities. He retired in 2011 and is currently Archbishop Emeritus of Adelaide.



**John Fitzgerald**  
Attended SHC 1976-1977

As a professional tennis player, John's greatest highlights came during the 11 years he represented Australia in the Davis Cup. John held a former Number 1 Doubles Ranking, won 7 Grand Slam Doubles Titles, a Career men's Doubles Grand Slam and was Australia's Davis Cup Captain from 2001- 2010.



The late **James Gleeson**  
Attended SHC 1937

After being ordained a priest in 1945, he later became Director of Catholic Education in the Adelaide Archdiocese. In 1961 he became the first South Australian priest to become Archbishop of Adelaide.



The late **Albert Hannan**  
Attended SHC 1903

Through a highly distinguished academic and legal career, Albert became Crown Solicitor of South Australia for 25 years. He was a champion in the commissioning of Aquinas College in Adelaide and has a wing of the College named in honour of his legacy.



The late **Philip Kennedy**  
Attended SHC 1944-1948

Philip was a Rear Admiral in the Royal Australian Navy and was later promoted to Commodore. Philip was made an officer of the Order of Australia in 1987 for exceptional service and performance of duty in the Royal Australian Navy, and is the highest ranking Old Collegian in Australia's armed forces. **Rob Kerin**

*Attended SHC 1966-1971*

Rob served as Deputy Premier of South Australia 1998- 2001 and as our 43rd Premier from October 2001 to March 2002. Actively involved in the areas of industry and sport, Rob is currently the Executive Chairman of Primary Producers South Australia and Regional SA.



**Shaun Micallef**

*Attended SHC 1972-1979*

Shaun is an Australian comedian, writer, producer, actor and TV presenter. A former College Captain of Sacred Heart, Shaun completed a Law Degree at the University of Adelaide before pursuing a career in entertainment, later being awarded a Logie in 1989, 2000, 2010 and 2016.



**Dr Leon Simon**

*Attended SHC 1955-1963*

Receiving a PhD from the University of Adelaide, Dr Simon held positions at several distinguished universities both domestically and abroad, and later became Professor of Mathematics at Stanford University before serving as Chair of Mathematics in 1998. In 1994, he was awarded the Bocher memorial prize, which is only awarded every 5 years to a ground breaking author in analysis.



The late **Dr Lawrie Smart**

*Attended SHC 1941-1946*

An innovator, Dr Smart was made a member of the Order of Australia for significant service to orthodontics. Dr Smart also pioneered the treatment of cleft palate patients in South Australia. An early student of Aquinas College, Dr Smart was the inaugural student president (*Pictured: Dr Smart's family accepted this honour on his behalf*).



**Sergio Melta**

*Attended SHC 1972-1975*

Sergio is a former Australian soccer player who played more than 500 games across 22 years for Adelaide City, where he won three national championships and was crowned National Soccer League Player of the Year in 1986. Sergio represented Australia in 1986 and is one of three Australians who have achieved UEFA A accreditation (*pictured with his family*).



**Matthew Pavlich**

*Attended SHC 1997-1999*

Widely renowned as one of the best forwards and captains in modern Australian Rules Football, Matthew represented Fremantle in 353 games over 17 years, being named All Australian on six occasions.



**David Sincock**

*Attended SHC 1951-1960*

David played cricket for Australia at test-match level between 1964 and 1966. David played 46 first-class matches for South Australia and was credited by the great Sir Garry Sobers as being the biggest turner of the ball he ever faced.



**Graham Spurling**

*Attended SHC 1949-1953*

Graham was recognised as a member of the Order of Australia through his contribution to the manufacturing industry, having held a number of Executive and non-executive postings, both locally and abroad, including CEO of Mitsubishi Motors Australia. (*pictured with wife, Peggy*).



The late **Robert Stigwood**  
*Attended SHC 1945-1950*

Robert was a music entrepreneur and film producer and is known internationally for his contribution to the music industry. He is perhaps best known as Manager of the Bee Gees. In 2015, he was inducted into the South Australia Hall of Fame and established a fellowship program which mentors local musicians.



**Bernard Wadsworth**  
*Attended SHC 1947-1951*

Bernard was the leading physicist in his field for decades. In 1961 he joined the Laboratory of Nuclear Science at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he was later promoted to Principal Research Engineer. He retired from the Laboratory for Nuclear Science at MIT in 2003 after 41 years of distinguished service (*pictured with his family*).



**Jim Whiting**  
*Attended SHC 1966-1974*

Jim is currently the Managing Director of Badge Constructions, the state's leading commercial builder, and one of our nation's largest privately owned commercial construction companies. It is also the company which constructed the Br Joseph McAteer Centre. Jim is a long standing member of the Sacred Heart College Foundation, alongside several other voluntary positions and committees.



The late **John Willis**  
*Attended SHC 1921-1926*

John was professed Brother Damian Willis in 1927. He is a former Director and Principal at Randwick and Assumption Colleges, was the first Old Collegian to return as Principal in 1952, and was appointed Provincial in 1956.



**Dean Wills**  
*Attended SHC 1947-1949*

Dean's outstanding business career spanned 46 years and included roles as Chairman and Chief Executive of CocaCola Amatil. He was awarded Businessman of the Year in 1990 by the Australian Business Magazine and credited his wonderful career to resilience, persistence and determination.

Jayden Betterman of Sacred Heart College Middle School was recently announced as the EU Centre for Global Affairs first “My EU” Film Competition winner.

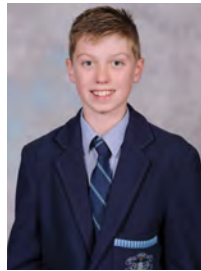
Jayden shared his mother’s migration story from Poland to Adelaide. Among other things, the film mentioned the Pennington Migration Hostel, the longest running of South Australia’s Migration hostels. Such stories form an important part of the story of South Australia and its connections to Europe.

The EU Centre for Global Affairs has designed and developed the idea of “My EU” Film Competition as part of its Primary School Cultural Outreach activities. Students in the primary years 4–7 in South Australian Schools were invited to enter a competition and to:

- Interview a family member or friend from Europe living in South Australia, and bring that person’s story to life, including those of British heritage, or
- Describe the EU itself and how it benefits members. This may include benefits to Britain, or
- Portray a future in which the student/s themselves are living in a European EU country, or
- Create other imaginative EU depictions.

Students could elect to enter a storyboard, poster or other medium for the competition, such as a script of an interview with someone from Europe living in South Australia. Prizes for a winner and a runner up were provided as part of the competition. Entries are judged by a panel from the EU Centre for Global Affairs and the Children’s University at The University of Adelaide.

Congratulations to Jayden on this significant achievement!

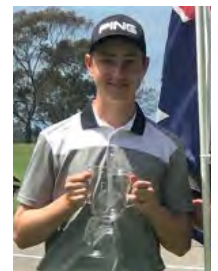
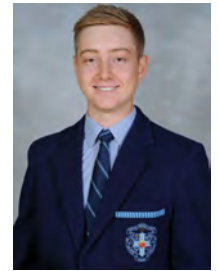


### Jackson Kalz (Year 12)

# 23<sup>rd</sup> Marist Netball Carnival Champions

On Sunday 18 June 2017, the SHC Open A Netball side flew to Canberra and drove to Red Bend Catholic College in Forbes, NSW to partake in the 23<sup>rd</sup> Australian Marist Netball Carnival. The SHC side was one of 17 schools from around Australia to make the trip for a chance to take home the title of Marist Champions 2017.

This title had previously been achieved by SHC in 2001, 2014 and 2016. The returning champions were keen to defend their title under the guidance of Captain, Bec Allchurch, and Vice Captain, Sophie Agostino.

Day one of match play saw the SHC team face eight Colleges from around Australia in a carnival style format. The SHC team managed some injuries and performed brilliantly, dropping only one match for the day to finish 2nd place and progress through to the top 8 Championship draw for day two. On the second day, the SHC team matched up against seven Colleges in the Championship top eight, finishing in 2nd place and progressing through to the finals.

On the morning of the final day, SHC faced Lavalla College, Victoria, in the Semi-Final. After being down five goals at half time, the SHC girls stormed home with a seven goal turn around to win by two goals and progress to the Grand Final against Sale Catholic College, Victoria. Down a break at half time in the Grand Final to Sale (5-7), the SHC girls remained calm under pressure and showed true Hearts' spirit in the



second half to take the Marist title for 2017 by one goal at the final siren. The 10 strong side was well deserving of the title of Marist Champions. Congratulations!

The SHC Girls Football side were playing in their 5th consecutive state knockout grand final against Henley High.

After the disappointment of not playing on Adelaide Oval due to poor weather, an opportunity to win a 4th title since 2013 was still up for grabs. On a muddy and wet day for football on Woodville Oval, this grand final was going to be brutal.

The game started with all momentum going Henley's way, goaling within the first 2 minutes. Henley were more physical and intent on winning the ball and we looked shell-shocked. The SHC girls were half-asleep and it showed, as the margin blew out to 18 points in 10 minutes. It was worrying signs, as

this type of application from the girls is very rare. As the quarter drew to a close, the girls finally switched into action and started winning the ball and keeping it in our own half: two shots on goal showed positive signs we had the potential to compete. Now going with the breeze, it was important to step it up and use the advantage. The girls started to win more ball and "hack" it forward with big kicks. Despite peppering the points early, we eventually managed back-to-back goals and the margin was now 4 points at the main break. Henley was a solid outfit and this game would come down to who could apply the pressure the longest.

Going into the premiership quarter, the girls were now really up for the contest and it showed in their focus, chasing and tackling, and in our defensive work. Our defenders were doing a fantastic job of playing tight and repelling Henley attacks. It certainly was a willing game of football and, despite dominating field position and possession, we just couldn't kick the all-important goal to put us in front. Eventually, we capitalized and put our noses in front for the first time, only to then see Henley hit back quickly with an easy goal. At the final break, we were down by 3 points, going with the breeze in the last quarter.

Early in the final term, we had plenty of the ball in our forward 50m but Henley was defending so stoutly, with a flood of numbers at the contest. This early dominance moved to Henley, who got

on top, controlling the ball in their own half. With 4 minutes left on the clock and the title looking hard to grasp, we wrestled the ball down the wing - this was our last opportunity to kick the winner. With 2 minutes remaining and the situation looking out of reach, a controversial free kick was awarded, 15m out on a slight angle. Annie Kellock lived every player's dream of kicking the winner, as she went back, under pressure, and kicked truly. When the siren sounded to indicate an SHC victory, the girls celebrated loud and proud and dived around in the mud with smiles on their faces. This truly was a nail biter, a hard-earned victory in very trying circumstances. As coaches, we are very proud of all the girls and their efforts and how they represented their school with pride and passion.

For the match, our midfield of Emma Smith, Tessa Kohn, Tait Mackrill and Eirenn Harkness were pivotal in winning the ball and getting it forward. Our defenders, led by Micaela Hayes and Alice Fry played tight and repelled Henley attacks; and forwards Annie Kellock and Indianna Paull gave us an excellent avenue in attack. Emma Smith was deservedly awarded the Best Player after a consistent four-quarter effort.

This night was a chance for the three Senior Dance classes to demonstrate their performance skills to an audience (family and friends), as well as share the work they have been doing this semester.

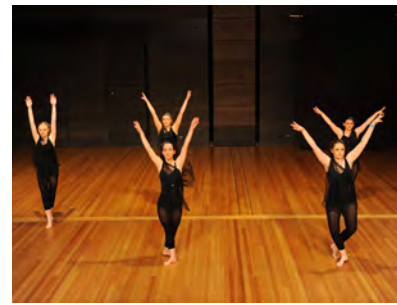

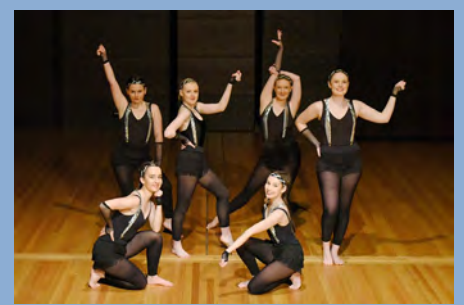

# Inaugural Year 6 Music Academy



On Tuesday 15 August, the Year 6 Sacred Heart College Music Academy had their inaugural solo performance evening at the Middle School. Each boy in the Academy performed a solo piece, as well as several songs together as an ensemble. The majority of boys in the Academy only began learning their instrument at the beginning of the year, so it was a privilege to work with the students to prepare them for this concert, which showcased all the musical skills they have learnt so far. We were also fortunate to have the Studio Ensemble perform as special guests, which showed the students the type of ensemble they can join from next year.

Music is a full brain workout, as when you learn an instrument, your auditory (ears), visual (eyes), and motor (body) cortexes are all firing messages at the same time.

Learning a musical instrument doesn't make students 'smarter'; rather, it

makes learning 'easier' (i.e. it changes a country road to a highway).

The Music Academy is specifically focused on improving executive function skills such as attention span, problem solving and control of emotional responses, which are important for any career choice, not just being a 'rock star'! Music learning is for everyone and it has benefits for all of us, regardless of future careers or previous experience.

Parents, teachers and students completed a eight-question survey at the beginning of the program, and when students responded to the statement 'My mind wandered when I should have been listening', data suggested that only 14% of students identified that they were staying on task all the time, and only 20% were always remembering what someone told them to do.

Great news is that from the first survey to the second survey (which

was conducted in Week 6 of Term 2), parents were observing their sons being more polite, better listeners, tidier, calmer, and demonstrating an improved ability to concentrate. In fact, based on parent observations, these areas improved by 13% overall for the cohort.

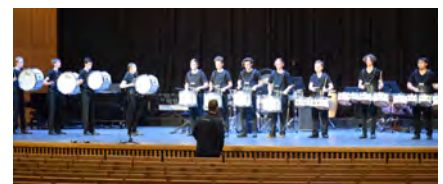

### Tyler Kelly

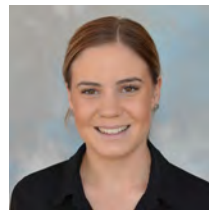


I finished Year 12 at SHC in 2015 and have been working as a tutor and supervisor in the Boarding House for the past two

a chat about things, as someone closer to their age. I hope to continue my role as a tutor in the girls' boarding house, as it has been nothing but positive!

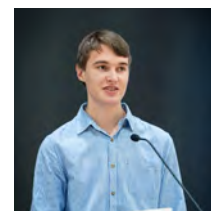
### Amy Noll

### Josh Smith



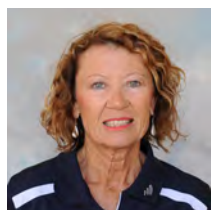
I was a boarder at SHC from 2014 to 2016. Since school finished, I have started medicine at Adelaide University, which has been

has been acting in the position while Barb was on Long Service Leave and Bernie has also acted in the position in previous years.

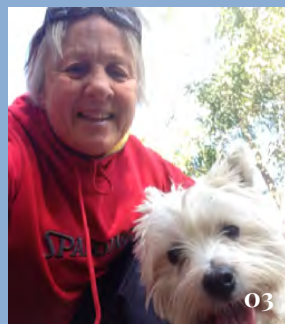
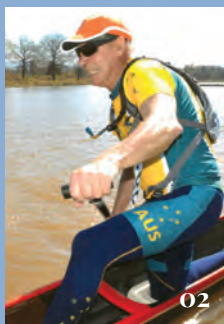

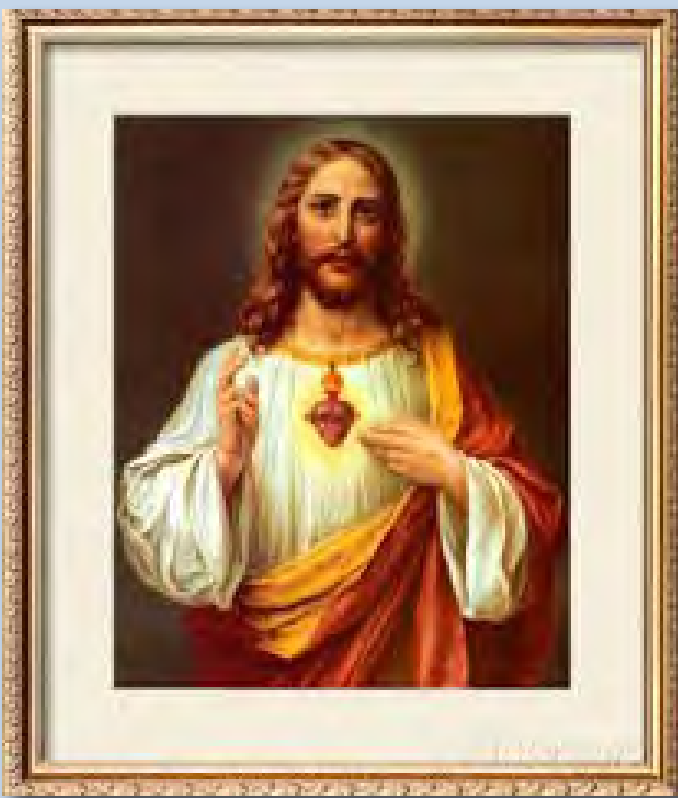

## The Twelve Promises

He extracted them from her writings and had his printing company make cards with The Twelve Promises. They became so popular that by 1895 they had been translated into 238 different languages.

1. I will give them all the graces necessary in their state of life.
2. I will establish peace in their homes.
3. I will comfort them in their afflictions.
4. I will be their secure refuge during life, and above all in death.
5. I will bestow abundant blessings upon all their undertakings.
6. Sinners shall find in my Heart the source and the infinite ocean of mercy.
7. Tepid souls shall become fervent.
8. Fervent souls shall quickly mount to high perfection.
9. I will bless every place in which an image of my Heart shall be exposed and honoured.
10. I will give to priests the gift of touching the most hardened hearts.
11. Those who shall promote this devotion shall have their names written in my Heart, never to be effaced.
12. I promise thee in the excessive mercy of my Heart that my all-powerful love will grant to all those who communicate on the first Friday in nine consecutive months the grace of final penitence; they shall not die in my disgrace nor without receiving their sacraments. My Divine Heart shall be their safe refuge in this last moment.

Although our society is becoming more secular, the opportunities for our Marist community to continue to be agents of change increase, and the values of the Gospel have never been more prevalent than they are today. Our Marian charism prompts us to be attentive to the calls of our time. We need to surpass religious and cultural borders and, like Mary, be figures of tender strength for all, especially the young and marginalised.

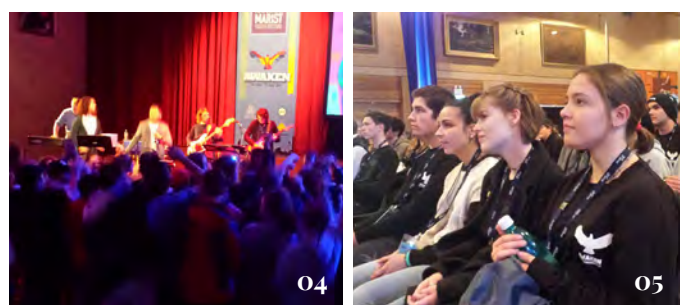
# 2017 Marist Youth Festival

## Foundation President's Report

2017 has seen a number of College aspirations come to fruition, some with the support of the SHC Foundation. For me the highlights, since my last update in March 2017, have included:

- The opening of the Brother Joseph McAteer Centre. This was an important day for the community. I was unable to make the event itself due to work travel commitments, however, speaking to a number of people connected to the College, it was a day that marked a significant growth milestone. # The Archives

## *50 years at Sacred Heart Middle School (St Joseph's) and 120 years at Sacred Heart Senior School in 2017!*

Sacred Heart College has seen many changes over the years, both at the Senior School and Middle School campuses.

The inspiration behind the founding of Sacred Heart College started in 1817 when a zealous, audacious youth priest working in a poor and educationally starved part of France, was called to the bedside of a dying fifteen year old boy. Shocked at his ignorance of God, the priest, Marcellin Champagnat, gathered two young men together and thus began the teacher order, the Marist Brothers.

Initially set up as a boys' only college and with only six enrolled students "Sacred Heart High School" was opened in 1897 in Port Adelaide with Principal, Brother Stephen at the helm.

With quickly growing enrolments, in 1902 Sacred Heart High School outgrew its Port Adelaide location and moved to a rented premises at Semaphore where it became known as Sacred Heart College. Having grown quickly, in 1905 a 2 acre block was purchased at Largs Bay and Sacred Heart College moved again before moving to its permanent home at Somerton Park in 1914 with 62 students.

Sacred Heart certainly wasn't known for its sporting opportunities when it was first established. The school yard at Port Adelaide was very small and when the transfer was made to Semaphore there was no school yard at all. The broad, open, seaweed strewn beach was the playground. The first mention of sporting success was in the "Southern Cross" on 25 November 1904 where it is recorded that we had victories over Pulteney Street School and the ex-students of Grange Road School at cricket. There is no mention of any other sports.

In 1905 the College transferred to Largs Bay, just across Military Road from Largs Bay Reserve. The school yard was rough and sandy, not suitable for tennis. There is reference, however, to the "College Cricket League" that had been formed.

In 1914 when Sacred Heart College relocated to Somerton Park, there was a tennis lawn in the main grounds and Sacred Heart Tennis became a popular sport.

With increasing numbers, gradually more and more sports were being played and at the beginning of 1965

there were no fewer than nine on the sporting curriculum: athletics, football (13 teams), cricket (10 teams), gymnastics (a select squad competed in the State and National Championships), tennis (more than 60 played for the College each week), baseball (3 teams), golf (40 competed in the Annual Tournament on the North Adelaide course), rowing (30 boys in the rowing team) and swimming. In that year, basketball, a sport new to the College, was introduced and it proved to be very popular in the years to come.

In stark contrast to our new "Brother Joseph McAteer Centre" in 1957 an "adequate" gymnasium unit was considered to be fifteen sets of apparatus, comprising horizontal bars, parallel bars, Roman rings, a horizontal ladder, vaulting horse, and springboard. This provided hours of beneficial exercise during recreations and free time.

Every Tuesday all classes in the College received half an hour formal training in apparatus work from a professional gymnastics instructor who came from the city.

In wet weather, gym classes were conducted indoors in the change shed, which was constructed so that it would be quickly cleared and adapted for such a purpose. The apparatus were extremely popular with all the students and there was always a queue for each apparatus.

Over the years the number of sports has changed and increased. Baseball and rowing were very popular sports for a number of years but have been replaced over the years with other sports.

The College's reputation has also grown over the years as one of the most successful academic Colleges in South Australia and is now known as much for its sporting prowess as it is for its academic achievements with many high achieving old scholars having attended at the College.

In 1977 the College saw another big change with the introduction of girls. The first class of Year 12 girls started at Sacred Heart College. At this time, the College was still teaching boys in Years 6 to 12. In 1978, Year 11 and Year 12 was introduced for girls and boys were still taught from years 5 to 12.

In 1979 Sacred Heart officially became a co-education facility teaching boys and girls from Years 10 to 12 only.

## St Joseph's College

The Blessing and Opening of St Joseph's College (Preparatory to Sacred Heart College) took place on 19 March 1967 by His Grace, Archbishop Gleeson. The first Principal was Br David Faccdi. The College commenced for fifth grade level and catered

primarily for boys from the parishes of St Marys, Edwardstown, Marion, Colonel Light Gardens, Glenelg, Brighton and Kurralta Park.

There were five classrooms being used for two 5th Grades, 6th Grade, 7th Grade and 1st Year and the total enrolment was 153. There were only 6 members of staff, Br David, Br Brian, Br Canisius, Br Cyril and Mrs M Browne with Miss H Mansfield who taught art on Wednesday afternoons.

St Joseph's was renamed in 1977 to Sacred Heart College Junior School and had Brothers as Principals until 1980 when layman Mr Tom Lambert was appointed.

In 1988 it saw another name change and became Sacred Heart College Middle School.

It was always believed that sport, in its proper place, was essential in a boys' College as it deepened school spirit, makes a boy healthy and active and helps him grow into a well-adjusted person, besides giving him something positive to do in his leisure time. So, under the guidance of Brother Cyril, the opening year of St Joseph's saw an Athletics Carnival, cross country championship, football and basketball.

In 2017, the enrolment across the College is currently 984 students at the Senior School with 674 students at the Middle School.

Moving forward into 2019 will again see significant changes with the amalgamation of Marymount College and the formation of Champagnat Campus.

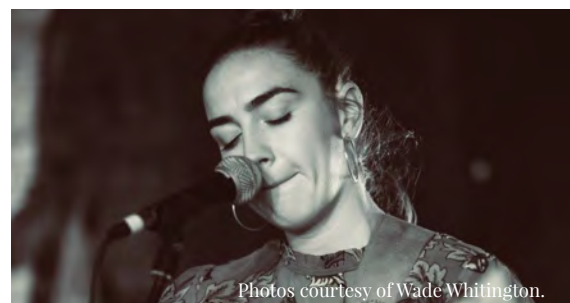
It was wonderful to hear the success stories of many Old Scholars; some of whom have established successful businesses, travelled the world on multiple occasions, started families, and competed at the highest level.

## Frank Sebastyan ('59)

**Frank Sebastyan ('59)** continues to have a very full and colourful life which started with the creation of the band 'In-Sect'.

The band started out in the early 1960s and became 'the In-Sect' in 1966. One of the few bands of the area to release an album which was called 'Insect A Sides'. The album, and their stage show, was a mix of middle of the road, top 40 covers, show band or wild R&B songs.

The In-Sect rock band was formed in Adelaide in 1965 and was an instant hit in the Australian market as a show band. Their performances were legendary and were such that they could successfully perform to "teenybopper" crowd, nightclub or cabaret circuit. This was regarded as quite unique at the time.

The In-Sect was an early Adelaide pioneer of the local recording industry, enjoying a number of chart successes on the W&G label. Their biggest hit at the time was "Let This be a lesson", written by Simon Paul and it was given heavy airplay by top 5AD DJ at the time, Bob Francis.

Today Frankie and the In-Sect is a six piece band with special four-part vocal harmony of talented, enthusiastic performers who have a special skill to really get a crowd going. The band was initiated by band founder and entertainer Frank Sebastyan, and is supported by vocalist Sonja Dixon and Rodney Scott, Bass and Vocals.

Frankie and the In-Sect is one of Adelaide's most entertaining bands, with a broad base of authentic rock 'n' roll to current funk energy and is great to listen and dance to.



Since that time Frank worked for many years with deceased Old Scholar **Paul Linkson ('50)** who was his boss at Radio 5DN. His friendships include Cliff Richard. He owned the very popular and iconic Fun Factory, Downtown and Magic Mountain prior to his retirement in 2007.

However retirement has bought some new exciting times, as Frank now works as a model with Tanya Powell Modelling Agency, combining that with the occasional movie role. He also hosts the radio show Coast FM. In his spare time he enjoys riding his Harley Davidson.

Silver fox Frank Sebastyan isn't even 10 in modelling years but he can lay claim to being the world's oldest male model (The Advertiser 28/11/16 (Fashion Editor Anna Vlach).

The grandfather of six, who is 73 years young, is signed with Adelaide agency Powell Models. Deshun Wang made headlines as the "world's hottest grandpa" when, at age 79, he appeared shirtless during 2015 China Fashion Week. However, he was an actor making a guest appearance on the catwalk and not a professional, meaning he is not the world's oldest male model.

That title belongs to Frank, who is looking forward to January when he will celebrate a decade of working in the modelling industry.

In demand as the father of the bride at wedding expos, one of his most recent gigs was a photoshoot for Unley

Council. With a penchant for fancy footwear and socks, he kicked off his modelling career in January 2007 with a little help from wife, Christine. Following Frank's retirement from the business world, where he was the founder of amusement centres Downtown and Magic Mountain, Christine contacted model agent Tanya Powell, the then owner of what is now Powell Models.

A born performer, the lead singer of '60s band The In-Sect, was booked to appear in a bridal expo at the Adelaide Showground.

"I got on stage and just went for it," Frank said. "I've never suffered nerves, it's not in my genes ... I suppose I'm just a bit of a show-off."

With a love of fashion and a wardrobe that included labels like Versace and Alexander McQueen because "older people don't have to wear boring stuff," Frank was keen to put his own stamp on shows.

His favourite fashion party trick was to stop at the end of the runway and lift the hem of his trousers to reveal bright orange, purple or red socks. "Everybody would crack up ... I have also worn sunnies a few times and always make eye contact with the audience," he said.

"Other models stare and look solemn ... like they're going to funerals."





## MICHAEL BOWER ('64) and BRIAN VAUGHTON ('64

**Michael Bower ('64) and Brian Vaughton ('64)** attended Sacred Heart College in the late 1950s and early 60s, where they played the traditional sports, but always had a passion for music.

After leaving Sacred Heart College in 1964, they formed their first band *The Mustangs*. Mick Bower played rhythm guitar and Brian Vaughton played the drums, with Rick Morrison and Gavin Webb on guitars.

They regularly rehearsed in a shed behind a hotel owned by Brian's family. They built a following with local teenagers, cutting their teeth at dance halls like the Beat Basement and the Octagon.

In late 1965 *The Mustangs* renamed themselves as "The Masters Apprentices". Bower supplied the name because "We were apprentices to the masters of the blues – Chuck Berry, Bo Diddley, Jimmy Reed, Elmore James and Robert Johnson". They referred to themselves as "the band that baked the cake," as the original Masters Apprentices mixed the blues with rock 'n' roll and changed the face of music in Australia.

By early 1966 they were one of the

most popular beat bands in Adelaide, regularly selling out concerts in the city, as well as making visits to outlying towns such as Murray Bridge, Mount Gambier and Whyalla. They also made TV appearances on the Channel 7 Telethon.

In 1998, *The Masters Apprentices* were inducted into the Aria Hall of Fame and in 2014 the new incarnation of the Masters Apprentices came about when the band was inducted into the SA Music Hall of Fame.

Well, after leaving the band in 1967, they are now back playing as the 1965 Masters Apprentices and, if you ask them, they are sounding better than ever.

Bower said Adelaide was very much at the forefront of the rock scene in those days, thanks largely to the influx of British immigrants flooding the city's north.

"We'd take breaks at the Octagon in Elizabeth and talk to kids who only a few weeks earlier had been watching the Rolling Stones and The Who," he said.

"We were very connected to what was happening overseas."

Drummer Brian Vaughton said the decision for a bunch of young men to throw in their day jobs and chase a rock 'n' roll dream was something their

parents were initially quite sceptical of.

"Yeah, they weren't happy – especially when we gave up our jobs before we'd even had a hit," Vaughton laughed.

"But giving up sport was an even bigger thing in my family. My dad (Rolly Vaughton) was a Sheffield Shield cricketer and a very good footballer and baseball player; so when I chose music over sport, that was pretty major.

"Dad might have been disappointed that I'd given up sport, but whenever one of our clips appeared on (rock TV show) *Kommotion* he'd call all his pub mates into the bar to watch his boy."

While the parents may have eventually approved of the band, the raw rock they produced was very far from family-friendly.

"These days there are so many genres of music, but back then there were two types – nice music and rude music," Vaughton said.

"We were very much in the rude music camp."

# Where are they now?

## Tiffany De Sousa Machado ('93)

**Tiffany De Sousa Machado ('93)** is currently undertaking a combined PhD/Masters in Psychology (Health) after gaining a first class in her Honours degree in Psychology. For her postgraduate studies she is exploring the cultural pressures placed on women in our society and investigating solutions to isolation, loneliness and disenfranchisement with the community.

Tiffany has been awarded a prestigious and highly competitive Westpac

Future Leaders Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to a student studying a Masters or a PhD, who has demonstrated considerable potential as a leader in his or her potential area of study. Tiffany is only one of two students receiving such an award at the University. As well as receiving a scholarship worth up to \$120,000 Tiffany will receive opportunities to engage in dedicated leadership training and also forge links with other high-achieving young people in Australia and internationally.





## D'Arcy Lunn (\*95)

**D'Arcy Lunn (\*95)** treads the world so lightly he can live on \$2 a day and sleep just about anywhere, although he doesn't do concrete floors any more. On a visit home to Adelaide, staying at Aldinga, he would hop on an old bike and ride to the city. It took half the day to get there and back, but what's the rush?

It sounds a bit like self-deprivation, a monkish life built upon sacrifice. All that austerity would make you feel good, but you could never splash out on something extravagant, or buy flowers, or nurture a coffee habit or own a cat. Talk to Lunn and you understand it does mean all these things, but it also unleashes a freedom that money cannot buy. He is driven by an informed ethical stance that powers what he does and how he lives.

At 38, Lunn is that rare thing, a citizen of the world who moves between countries with total ease, going where he wants and trusting that he will get by. He never signed up for the daily grind that keeps the rest of us rooted in one spot, planning our careful trips away with accommodation booked in advance.

Lunn, tall and lanky without an ounce of fat, grew up in Minlaton and Kadina where his dad worked for the stock and station agent, Elders. He came to Adelaide in Year 5 to attend Forbes Primary and then Sacred Heart College. When his brother married a Japanese woman, the family visited Japan and he came away fascinated by how people who were fundamentally the same could live so differently. When his economics teacher at Sacred Heart ran a case study on Sierra Leone, one of the poorest countries in the world, a social

justice campaigner was born.

"I was intrigued by human value and what that meant," Lunn says. "It was a kind of social justice. There was a difference depending on where you were born, and you could be born into more challenges at one place than another."

At age 15, he was destined to become a teacher in country SA and play footy on weekends, but when school finished he took a gap year and went to Japan to work in a French bakery. He couldn't speak Japanese, nor could he bake bread, but he mastered both in three months.

"I still speak fluent Japanese," he said before returning to Japan late last year on a Rotary Scholarship to complete a Master in Peace Studies. "I was completely immersed in the culture, and in love with it."

In the late 1990s he studied teaching at Flinders University and before he finished, he was made an offer. The Oak Valley community on the APY Lands in South Australia's remote north needed a teacher; would he go? This was the relocated Maralinga community, a day's drive from Ceduna, which followed a semi-traditional lifestyle.

"They did a call-out, and my uni teacher said 'I know a guy who is crazy enough,'" says Lunn. "I think he picked me because I had that sense of adventure and was keen to get out into the world."

the 2017 international Rose of Tralee.

Aoife travelled to Ireland in August to participate in the Irish Festival which is second only in size in Europe to the Eurovision song contest.

## Alex Neal-Bullen ('13)

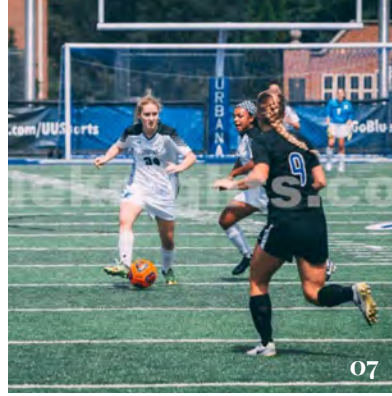
**Alex Neal-Bullen ('13)** has just locked in a new contract with the Melbourne Football Club and will remain with them until at least the end of the 2019 season.
