Dear Parents/Guardians,

The burst of sunshine has lifted our spirits, warming our bodies and awakening our senses to the hints of Spring. Unfortunately, this change in the weather arrived a week too late for the Year 7 Camp which unfolded amongst icy winds and pouring rain. None the less, the girls and their teachers embraced every opportunity to engage in the rich array of activities and challenges on offer. Their return on Friday presented us with the familiar drowsy eyed students and weary teachers, still eager to tell stories of adventure, triumphs, persistence and fun. There were smiles

from ear to ear and sighs of relief as parents were greeted with open arms. I take this opportunity to thank the teachers for their commitment to the school camp program. Their care of students is outstanding and the range of activities, designed to build community, resilience and friendship are carefully prepared and delivered. No doubt a good night's sleep was enjoyed by students and staff.

The Year 12 Production directed by teacher Jessica Spagnuolo, was a confronting, moving and intelligent portrayal of the challenges faced by young girls and women. '*The Lucky Ones*' tested the audience's willingness to understand the impact of accepted social norms on girls and women. It was powerful. It was moving. It was life-changing. I congratulate the Year 12 girls, Sarah, Georgia, Brittany, Olivia, Ariella and Chelo for their extraordinary performances, supported by Doan behind the scenes. I thank Drama teacher Jessica, for providing such a rich and sophisticated text for the girls to study and perform.

The College Leadership Team has spent several weekends enjoying the good company of prospective parents. The interview process unfolds with great generosity as parents share with us their hopes and dreams for their daughters and we learn about each girl's strengths and interests. Enrolments have almost concluded for 2021 and 2022.

I have undertaken a project this term to shadow students for a school day. So far, I have been a Year 8, 9 and 11 student. I have delighted in these experiences and have learnt much about "the day in the life of a St Dom's girl." I will write a more extensive reflection when the project is complete – but for now can I say it has been pure joy getting to know the girls. I have learnt how to take excellent photos, what a Marxist analysis needs and most importantly... played hand ball on the bottom court. I look forward to my next opportunity to put on my flat shoes and meet my new "buddies".

On Tuesday night we held our first round of face to face Parent Teacher Interviews. With our COVID-19 Safe Plan in place along with COVID-19 Marshals all seemed to unfold in an orderly and safe manner. I am most grateful to our Work Health and Safety Officer, Sally Hermel – who we affectionately call Safety Sal! Sally makes sure that our school is safe for staff, students and parents.

One of the highlights of Tuesday night was the opportunity to greet parents and chat about; their daughters, school life, work life, the weather, COVID, interstate travel and other such conversations. It is these moments of gathering that have been sorely missed due to the pandemic that continues to interrupt our lives. I recently read that St Dominic 'was a man with a mission to bring the Gospel to the marketplace.' How we long for the "marketplace" to return to St Dominic's; a place to share our stories, make connections and celebrate news. Let us continue to pray for such a time of gathering in friendship and hospitality.

From the **LEADERSHIP TEAM**

DIRECTOR OF TEACHING & LEARNING

A major component of the Term 3 Pastoral Care program in the secondary school is to prepare students for 2021 Subject Selection. It is a time for students to reflect on their strengths as learners and possible pathways beyond school. The partnership between home and school is critical in maintaining a healthy dialogue to support students' explorations.

I am pleased to share that new subjects will be introduced in the senior school next year; **Stage 1 Psychology**, with the intent of Stage 2 being offered in 2022, **Stage 2 Child Studies** and **Stage 2 Health & Wellbeing**. Year 10 and 11 students and their parents attended a one-to-one meeting today, with their Home Class teacher to make the final decision about their subjects in 2021. Year 7 to 9 students will be bringing their Subject Selection forms home in the coming days.

PARENT/TEACHER INTERVIEWS were held on Tuesday 25 August and will run again Monday 7 September. These evenings provide an opportunity for students, parents and teachers to discuss the learning journey of each student. Parents can learn more about their daughter's achievements and find out areas for growth and improvement. If you haven't yet, I encourage parents to book in a time for Monday 7 September, to discuss your daughter's learning.

THE CLASS OF 2020 are now half way through their final term of secondary schooling. It's certainly been a year like no other. With support, students have responded to challenges with optimism. Their positive mindset and capacity to deal with the unexpected has been highlighted throughout this year on many occasions. We are incredibly proud of the way each student has risen to the changes and challenges and remained focused on her goals for 2020.

For Year 12 students, applications are now open on the SATAC website (https://www.satac.edu.au/) for tertiary courses starting in 2022. Year 12 Home Class teachers have been working individually with students to provide high quality information about pathways, to ensure students make choices that best support their preferred futures.

SACE has recently released their 2020 – 2023 Strategic Plan. This vision goes beyond assessing students' knowledge, skills and cognitive abilities. It brings the whole student into focus; their sense of belonging and connection to the world around them, their personal spirit, and their achievements. This vision aligns closely with the culture we nurture at St Dominic's. The Foundation to Year 10 Australian Curriculum review has also begun and will be completed before the beginning of 2022, with the aim to refine, realign and reduce existing content to create flexibility and scope for greater depth of learning. The educational landscape is changing. There is greater focus on preparing students to thrive in a time of rapid social and technological change, and complex social, environmental and economic challenges. It's certainly an exciting time to be involved in education.



Teaching & Learning News THE MIDDLE YEARS

SERVICE IN THE MIDDLE YEARS

"Every individual matters. Every individual has a role to play. Every individual makes a difference. And we have a choice: What sort of difference do we want to make?"

This is the challenge we pose to each of our students in the Middle Years, and this year has been no different. However, it has been challenging for the girls to get out into the community due to COVID-19. Nevertheless some were able to get out before restrictions came into place in mid-March, others were able to help to ease the burden of those restrictions, whilst some worked within the school community.

YEAR 7 AND 8 SERVICE EXTENSION

Service opportunities not only exist within the Pastoral Care and Curriculum programs but students can opt into extra-curricular events. Students in Years 7 and 8 were invited to participate in **Write a Book in A Day**, which is a fundraising event held to support the Kids Cancer Project. Students are challenged with raising funds



via activities and through sponsorship. At the time of writing, the group of 10 girls have raised \$3475. As a group they have successfully written a book in a day that will be given to the local Women's and Children's Hospital. As Matilda so correctly states "The whole experience was a blast and I would definitely consider doing it again next year. The best part was knowing that it was all for a good cause."

YEAR 10 SERVICE IN PASTORAL CARE

Year 10 students were introduced to the IPARD service learning model during Pastoral Care and began to Investigate needs in the community before Planning their Action. They were able to participate in a range of service activities that included *Volunteering at Vinnies*; joining the *Social Justice Group*; recording readings at Vietnamese Mass during COVID restrictions; and helping older family members. Part of the Service Learning is to complete **R**eflections about their experiences. Students gain much from making a difference:

Before working at the Salvos I really didn't know the value of the clothing and 'junk' we throw out... However, ... we learnt a lot about how all the items we donate ... not only helps the environment but also supports people who are in need... The thought [that some people] only having access to a small amount of resources upsets me.

YEAR 9 SERVICE IN CURRICULUM

Year 9 students were involved in service learning during their English classes as they investigated the need to persuade and inform the general population about the difficulties faced by migrants and their contributions to Australia. The outcome of

their action was a series of poems which were sent to the **Australian Migrant Resource Centre** and placed on display around the College. The girls conducted interviews with migrants, researched objects and created works that captured a wide range of experiences including:

"Go Back To Where You Came From" A daisy in a field of lava, Helpless and alone, The only comfort, A cross of gold.
