TEACHING & LEARNING

For the past two weeks many of our Year 12 students have been focused on their final assessment piece for the year – the external examinations. This year Biology, English Literary Studies, Geography and Modern History students completed their exams online. In 2021, we expect the list of Stage 2 exams completed online to grow. It's probably not surprising that many students who had both paper and online examinations said they preferred the online format. The examination period concluded last Thursday with the Physics exam. We hope to celebrate with the girls and their families, once the current community restrictions ease.

SACE Stage 2 results will be released on 15 December 2020. All students can access their results from 8:30 am on this day via SACE Student's Online. This has been an extraordinary year for our Year 12s. I wish them well as they embark on their next adventure.

Year 10 and 11 students have also been busy preparing for and undertaking exams this week. These exams are an important indication of how suitable a student is for a Stage 1 or 2 subject with an exam component the following year. Year 10 and 11 exam results will be released to students and parents with reports. Exams that were unable to be held on Thursday or Friday, owing to the South Australian Circuit Breaker, have been cancelled. This will be reflected in the Semester 2 report.

Some students may be approached by their teacher for further discussion about their 2021 subject choices, if staff believe another conversation is necessary. These discussions will take place by Wednesday 2 December 2020.

Just as we see more Stage 2 electronic exams each year, St Dominic's is also moving further into an electronic environment. This term all reports will be released online via SEQTA Engage, marking the end of an era of paper reports.

Finally, I would like to thank the St Dominic's Priory College community for so warmly welcoming me this year. It has become evident to me that St Dominic's students are global thinkers who are keen to learn, the staff are passionate about their work and the wider community are very giving of their time and energy.
