Dear Parents, Students and Staff,

I would like to express the deep gratitude of the Dominican Sisters for your love and messages of sympathy and care. We have been able to share with you our united sorrow in Sr. Mary Anne's sudden departing. Monday's celebration of her life at St. Laurence's Church, surrounded as we were by her family, and by so many students, parents and staff of the College past and present will live in my memory always. Sr. Mary Anne had three families; her own birth family in whom she rejoiced all her life; her family of Dominican Sisters among whom she generously lived out her God given religious vocation since she was 17-18 years old, and a third family.

You belong to her 3rd family, an extraordinary and diverse group of students, staff and parents from schools in Adelaide across 60 years. For the last 30 years of her ministry we at St. Dominic's Priory College have been the community which has been part her daily life and the recipients of her selfless desire and power to contribute. Here too she was a student in her own school days.

Your memories of Sr. Mary Anne, expressed in words and symbols are in the Chapel, together with so many floral tributes. They lift our hearts and remind us of you, dear Mary Anne, and of the truth that it is the humble who, "*will inherit the earth*". There is one consistent message from all who knew her, whether that was 50 years ago or as recently as 2017. We all agree

that she was a person with whom we were privileged to share our lives, so profoundly kind, so attentively generous to the needs of everyone around her and, as one of the tributes reads, so able to, "spot the good in everyone". She was truly a witness to Christ in our midst.

This Bulletin is dedicated to her memory.

Building your Child's Vocabulary - Kirsten Maycock

Building your child's vocabulary is essential for developing her comprehension skills, not to mention the positive impact it can have across the curriculum. There has been a great deal of research to support the notion that vocabulary size can be an indicator of academic success. It stands to reason that the more words a child knows, the more sense they can make of the world. Here are some easy ways to build your child's vocabulary.

Obviously talking to your child and having substantive conversations makes a real difference. Use interesting vocabulary with them. Comment on interesting words that you might hear used in conversations or in television programs. Play word games or guessing games with them as this helps the brain to store the information. You can use new vocabulary and give a little definition for them: 'This is your penultimate page: that means second to last'.

Reading widely and often exposes your child to new words in context. The more you read with your child, the more words your child will be exposed to and the more words

your child knows, the more sense she can make of what she reads.

You can begin by pointing out new words in a book before you read. This will keep some of the fluency of the story. During reading, talk about the new words you encounter. Have a dictionary (or electronic device) on hand to look up any interesting words. Try to link these words to any others they may already know...century is 100 years just like you need 100 cents to make a dollar. Give them a straightforward definition...absurd means silly or strange and link it to their own experience...It was a bit absurd to wear your beanie to the beach in summer!

Make the most of opportunities to use the new words in your own talk so that the meaning is reinforced. It is really helpful to ask your child to give definitions in their own words or create their own sentence with the word. Most importantly, make learning new vocabulary interesting and fun by showing enthusiasm for interesting words and using them as much as possible.

Students were able to share what student leadership in their school looks like and give examples on how each leader works with their community in an attempt to bring alive the Dominican ethos.
