













A Guide for Students with a Disability or Chronic Medical Condition at University in South Australia

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About this Booklet

This booklet aims to provide information to people with a disability or chronic medical condition who are considering university study.

Disability in this context is broad in scope and as defined in the Disability Discrimination Act (1992). It includes people with sensory and mobility impairment, chronic medical conditions, psychological or psychiatric conditions, neurological conditions such as learning disabilities and other disability conditions.

Studying at University

Places are not specifically reserved in university courses or programs for students with a disability.

Entry to University in South Australia

Entry to university in South Australia is via application to the South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC).

Information you may have provided to SATAC or to your school regarding your disability will not be forwarded to the university. You need to seek out the assistance you require. It is useful to seek advice well before the course commences. Make an appointment to see the Disability Advisor. Contact details are on page 6 of this booklet or contact the main telephone number for the university and ask to be connected.

There are three modes of entry into university:

- a) The South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE). Students from other states or territories can apply using their equivalent of SACE and the Tertiary Education Rank (TER). In Victoria this is known as the ENTER; in New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory as the UAI and in Queensland as the OP. Through the SATAC application process you should notify SATAC of special circumstances that have impacted on your SACE.
- b) Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT). Students over the age of 21 undertaking the STAT may apply to SATAC for adjustment to conditions for the examination. The SATAC website contains information about eligibility for admission via STAT.
- c) Special Entry Programs run by individual universities. Refer to the individual university prospective student websites.





If you are unsure of which discipline to choose, or are concerned about your capability to complete your studies, there are various services to support your decision making. These include school counsellors, National Disability Coordination Officers, Commonwealth Rehabilitation Service, course handbooks, university prospective student services and disability service providers.

Planning Ahead

If you think you may need support or adjustments in your study, you need to consider all of your daily activities and anticipate where problems may arise. For example:

- Who are the Disability Advisors on campus, where do I find them and what can they do for me?
- How will I communicate with others about what I need?
- Where are the lifts and toilets on campus?
- Where can I park?
- What type of assistive technology is available?
- Can I obtain an easily accessible locker?
- Is there a map of the campus so I can find the easiest route to classes as well as accessible entry and exit points?
- Can I make arrangements with the Library for extended loans if necessary?
- Will staff retrieve books from high shelves for me?
- Can I access the library, administrative offices and all essential places by using the lift?
- Think about your course of study and what may be involved for example, field trips, group work, lab classes and so on.

Disclosing Your Disability

If you require adjustments in relation to your studies on the basis of your disability you need to provide documentation of your disability from an appropriate treating physician to the university's Disability Service.

All documentation and other information you provide is treated confidentially and is not disclosed to other university staff without your permission.

It is recommended that you disclose at the earliest possible time. This can be done by completing the relevant section on your enrolment form. Early contact with a Disability Advisor is very important so that any supports or reasonable adjustments can be organised before classes start.

Accommodating Your Disability

South Australian universities have a specific processes in place, managed by the Disability Service in each university.

To establish an Access Plan, make an appointment with the Disability Advisor at your university.

Once you have provided appropriate documentation the Disability Advisor will negotiate a Disability Access Plan with you.

The Access Plan has three purposes:

- d) provide information to assist academic staff to support you in your studies;
- e) document any agreed services such as Auslan interpreters or assistive technology; and
- f) detail agreed adjustments to examination arrangements.

Information provided to lecturers

- Not what the disability is, but
- The functional impact of the disability, and
- Any adjustments they need to provide to overcome the impact of the disability.

Your Responsibilities

Provide supporting documentation.

- Negotiate support or adjustments in a timely manner. If you don't do this your needs will not be accommodated.
- Notify staff if your circumstances change.

Your Rights

The laws that specifically relate to the rights and responsibilities of students and providers of higher education in South Australia are the Equal Opportunity Act (1984), the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and the Disability Standards for Education (2005).

All universities have grievance procedures to deal with complaints. Refer to the websites of the individual universities.
