'GET UP! STAND UP! SHOW UP!' > Celebrating NAIDOC Week 2022




NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia in the first week of July each year to celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth.

Throughout Term 2, Gleeson students have been enthusiastically engaging in a variety of learning about First Nations cultures and histories (not just in NRW and NAIDOC Weeks!) Here are just a few:

- Year 7 English students completed their novel study on 'Bindi' by Kirli Saunders, which is written in verse. They found it very interesting comparing their start to school in comparison to the main character's experience starting school;
- All Year 9 students completed a unit on 'Indigenous Spirituality';

- Middle School STEM students created First Nations STEM Kits with Dreaming 'Mini Missions' as part of CESA's Make A Difference Competition. The kits were taken to St Joseph's Payneham and Keithcot Farm PS for young students to engage with this week;
- Our Year 10 Faith + Living (Indigenous Spirituality) students immersed in two amazing Silk Painting Contemporary Cultural Art Workshops with Iteka Sanderson-Bromley from @Kumarninthi and
 Malkawiriwiri:

- Year 10 F+L students produced an awesome podcast exploring the meaning and spiritual significance of First Nations Dreaming;
- Year 12 English students completed a film study on 'Samson and Delilah' by Warwick Thornton. Their understanding of First Nations peoples and cultures has been developed through learning around current remote communities.





We celebrated Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists with a special edition of 'NAIDOC Lunchtime Tunes' on Wednesday at lunchtime and our NAIDOC Keyring Pop Up Workshop held yesterday was very well attended!

FIRST NATIONS STEM KITS A BIG HIT @ ST JOSEPH'S + KEITHCOT FARM PS

Did you ever see a problem and think of a better way to solve it?

A talented group of STEM students have become innovators in creating a new service to improve STEM engagement for First Nations children. They have linked Dreamtime stories with focused STEM activities, and students at St Joseph's Payneham and Keithcot Farm Primary were the first to test these truly unique kits.

Mr Polvere, STEM teacher at St Joseph's, thought our Gleeson students did a fantastic job! The Year 3 and 5 students tested two kits, and from their expressive faces, we can see they were excited, highly engaged, and proud of their handson learning that showcases the brilliant STEM in First Nations culture.

The students listened attentively to 'How the Birds got Their Colours', and the next activity saw them explore 'How the Black Texta got Its Colour'. They learnt that chromatography could separate the black Texta into its colour components, just like how the black dove in the Dreamtime story spread its internal rainbow colours to all birds we have today.

The 'Make a Yipirinya grow' kit or caterpillar, as it's known in Arrernte, follows a Dreamtime story, and the




students designed and made their yipirinya. As the caterpillar twists and weaves when brought to life with water, they learn about capillary action. The extraordinary twist to our student's work is the encouraged STEM mindset.

The primary students were asked to change something and ask questions about what they think will happen and why. Our Gleeson innovators are to be commended as they've added a bilingual component to the STEM kits using the First Nations language.

Ms Colangelo from Keithcot Farm shared the mini missions with several STEM classes, enabling more kits to be tested. The ingenuity shown from the junior primary students was amazing and students especially enjoyed the growth mindset from the open learning activities. We sincerely thank Mr Polvere and Ms Colangelo for sharing their STEM classes as well as the staff and children at St Joseph's Payneham and Keithcot Farm.

Yipirinya is the Arrernte word for caterpillar. The Arrernte people believe that the area around Alice Springs, the McDonald ranges was created after a fight between alperenye beetles and yipirinya's. The alperenye used their jaws to chop the heads off the sacred yipirinya, and where their bodies fell, giant mountain ranges formed. The gaps between the mountains are where the caterpillar heads are missing.


READING MATTERS > Thomas Library 'Book of the Month'

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CATHOLIC EDUCATION ANNOUNCES 'FREEZE' ON FEES FOR 20223!

As South Australians continue to feel the impact of COVID-19, CESA has announced there will be no increase in school fees at 86 Diocesan schools for the 2023 school year - including Gleeson College!

In 2023, school fees will remain unchanged (frozen) at:

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- 62 diocesan Catholic primary schools
- 2 special schools St Patrick's and Our Lady of La Vang
- 22 diocesan secondary and combined colleges.

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"These decisions are part of our continued COVID-19 response as we seek to support families at a time when they are being impacted by rising costs and inflation," said Dr Neil McGoran, Director, Catholic Education SA.

"Amongst all the worries that families have at this time – worrying about an increase in school fees should not be one of them."

Dr McGoran said the fee-freeze would not impact the quality of education.

Since 2019, CESA has been implementing the Making Catholic Education More Affordable Initiative to ensure our schools are accessible to any family who wants their child to have a Catholic education.

"We're committed to keeping school fees as low as possible

and ensuring a Catholic education is affordable and accessible to all,' said Dr McGoran.


