In Week 9 of Term 2, our Year 11 students boarded buses to travel to two retreat sites – Nunyara at Belair and Openlight at Victor Harbor. The sun was shining to start the day and the students were energised and excited to experience the opportunity to come together as a cohort to attend their 2021 Year 11 Retreat.

The theme for this year's retreat was "The Bridge: Connecting Self, Others and God". The retreat sites offered the ideal locations to build on connections and to allow the students to share in moments of reflection and spiritual awareness, as well as engage in conversations with staff and each other.

The retreat program focused on self, their life journeys so far, and their hopes and dreams for the future. Staff connected with students and revealed their personal stories around a range of key topics in small discussion groups, which showed students a human side of life with struggles and accomplishments. Peppered through the two days were opportunities to affirm one another and to take part in prayer and liturgy. The highlight of the second day was the Olympic Ceremony and group events, which allowed students to work with their peers and become mentors for others.

These are fathers, mothers, children, brothers, sisters, and friends. Currently there is no cure. Brain cancer survival rates haven't changed in 30 years.

At lunchtime all were invited to attend the VIP event. Many purchased an ice block (brain freeze) and in total \$163 was raised for donation to the Beanies4Brain Cancer foundation. It was great to see so many of our school community members get involved, sporting their beanies and giving the brain teasers, riddles and puzzles a go while listening to the brain-stimulating sounds of Mozart!

ExL PROGRAM @ GLEESON > Thinking Outside The Box

During Term 2, the ExL Program students participated in several activities to help build skills in problem-solving, thinking outside the box, creativity, teamwork, improvising, elaborating and innovation.

Activities included:

Taboo: A game where participants need to describe a word on a card without using the most obvious synonyms.

Brain Teasers: 2 o T L under the S (classic literature)

Plasma Ball: Students learnt about plasma being the 4th state of matter that is found in lightning, the northern lights, and nebulas. They learnt the chemistry behind the plasma ball and how electrons try to escape through the human body.

Kahoots: States of matter

Marble Run: students constructed a rollercoaster, by trying to get the ball through turns and loop-the-loops using different models and instructions.

Skittles Blind Tasting/Data Analysis: Students took turns being blindfolded and guessed the skittles they were consuming. Students found it much harder to decipher the difference between the tastes of skittles without being able to see the colour. A common mistake was that strawberry was mistaken for lemon and vice versa.

Solar Windmill: Students constructed a solar windmill kit and then tested it in the sun. This was highly successful.

Mio Robot Building & Coding: Students worked together to construct a robot from a kit. After identifying its basic abilities (moving by infra-red, locating and moving to clapping sounds and transferring claps into commands, as well as picking up magnetic items off the floor). Students then downloaded an app and worked on programming the robot to go through an obstacle course.

As we move forward in Term 3, students wish to investigate escape rooms and how they are constructed. We will be going on an excursion to an escape room and have the chance to meet with a guest speaker in this profession.

DEVELOPING KEY CAPABILITIES IN YEAR 8

Developing Key Capabilties in Year 8 English, HaSS, Faith and Living

In 2021 in Middle School classes, teachers have been focussing on the Key Capabilities. These are included at the top of all our summative task sheets and focus on skills, that are not always obviously related to concepts and subject specific learning. I have been developing students awareness of how they are developing these in my Year 8 English, HaSS and Faith and Living classes, by getting students to reflect in various ways, on how they are engaging with their learning. Examples of student thoughts about their progress are included below.

In Faith and Living, Harmony Day activities challenged students to develop both self-awareness and intercultural understanding.

"Today when I saw the examples of racism, it made me think about what I can do when I see racism happen. Racism makes me question myself and why things have to be this way. I am very intercultural and globally minded because my Dad and all my grandparents and some of my aunties and uncles are all from Greece. My Pappou has some Vietnamese friends who own a restaurant in Virginia. So my Grandpa and I give them tomatoes and olive oil from our farm and they give us a meal."

In HaSS, our History topic "Spanish Conquest of the Americas" provided students with the challenge of an empathy task (*see below*) in which they were asked to write from both the



Spanish and Aztec point of view. This was designed to enhance students' **intercultural understanding**. In our study of World Religions in Faith and Living, writing the diary of a person of a specific faith challenged students to research beliefs and rituals, but then to place themselves in the shoes of someone living in another faith tradition.

After our Career Education unit in Faith and Living, **self-awareness** was demonstrated through reflection:

"In the last three weeks I've been encouraged to think about my future work life. I have considered how realistic the job is, what I have to do to get there, how I need to think to get to the job and what I can do now to improve the chances of getting the job."



At the **HEART** of learning excellence...



Being spiritually aware and inspired by faith is a capability addressed in the Sacraments unit in Faith and Living, and an authentic small task students were given was to interview someone about their experience of a sacrament.

"I was inspired by the way my Mum felt about getting confirmed. It made me think about whether I should get confirmed or not."

Monsignor Swann visited the class and students were able to interview him about his experience of the sacraments of Anointing and Holy Orders.

Our Gleeson HEART pedagogy (see *image above*) encourages teachers to provide authentic and engaging learning experiences for our students. Interviewing parents about their experience of work was a starting point in the Career Education unit, while the Product Launch at the end of the English Advertising unit provided students with a real audience of staff members and visiting Year 11 students to present their packaging, advertising and pitch to. Students reflected on becoming more socially adept in managing persuasive communication with an unfamiliar audience.

"I was very nervous about the Product Launch because I can become very shy around people, but I managed to be socially adept and face that fear."

"I believe I was socially adept when I had to talk to people about my product and what it does. This made me think faster every time my peers asked me a question."

"I was socially adept by building the courage to have an eye-to-eye conversation with the customer."

In a world where electronic, online and virtual communication are the norm for young people, developing confidence in face-to-face situations has been a key focus in my Year 8 classes. Sharing their learning one on one with peers, is a first step for many students in becoming effective communicators. In English, a Text Analysis unit comprising a study of the novel "Noodle Pie" and documentary "Ahn Does Vietnam" assessed through the writing of a comparative essay, encouraged students to become more **globally minded**.

"I came to respect cultural perspectives by watching a documentary and reading a novel about Vietnam and understanding the difference between the cultures of Vietnam and Australia."

Many of these kinds of reflections being done in all middle school classes, will contribute to the Learner Profiles, which will be an important part of the Learner Conversations, students will have with their caregivers and a teacher in Term 4.

The adoption of the Key Capabilities in 2020 and greater integration of these in 2021 has enabled students to see more clearly how, when engaged in authentic learning situations, they can develop resilience and grow in many capabilities which will get them ready to face future challenges in the work force and community, so that they can become thriving people, capable learners and leaders for the world God desires.

MIDDLE SCHOOL JAPANESE > Hiroshima, Nagasaki + Tanabata

July and August are very busy times on the Japanese annual calendar, which this year was even busier due to the timing of the Tokyo Olympics. If you spent much of the last few weeks watching the Games, you may have noted some references to a few major events. In class this term, many of our Middle School Japanese students explored two events that were particularly noteworthy; Tanabata, or the Star Festival, and the anniversary of the World War II Bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Tanabata has long connections to both Japanese and Chinese cultures. This festival celebrates a legend that two lovers, Orihime and Hikoboshi, separated by the Milky Way who are allowed to meet just once a year - on the seventh day of the seventh month. The modern calendar connects this event to July, but traditionally, this occurred in August. On this day, children and adults write their wishes on narrow strips of colored paper, called tanzaku, and hang them, along with other paper ornaments, on bamboo branches placed in the backyards or entrances of their homes and pray hard that their wishes will come true. With the July date coinciding with the school holidays, our class celebrated Tanabata in August, but was slightly delayed following the lockdown. Common wishes among the group connected to health, prosperity, management of COVID and positive relationships.

We also took time to reflect and consider the impact of the atomic bombs on Japan. Hiroshima Day commemorates the bombing of August 6th 1945, the day of the first deliberate atomic attack on humans, while Nagasaki Day (August 9th) remembers the impact of the only other intentional atomic bombing in





history. While these events are sad, and learning about them certainly set a sombre tone to our lessons, our students were able to reflect on the core message of peace that has come out of the devastation, as well as the push to end the potential use of weapons of mass destruction in our time. Our lesson explored the impact of the bombing on an individual scale, paying particular attention to the experiences of Sadako Sasaki, the girl famously known for attempting to fold 1000 paper cranes to receive a wish to recover from her sickness in the aftermath of the nuclear bomb's radiation. We did our part to fight for the cause of world peace by taking time to fold a few origami cranes of our own. While we fell well short of the ideal 1000 we needed, the learning that came from these lessons will stay with many well into the future.

YEAR 9 AFLW > AFL Max 'Day of an Elite Sportsperson Program'

The Year 9 AFLW class ventured to AFL Max to engage in the 'Day of an Elite Sportsperson Program' on Monday.

The session was broken into four quarters, each with a slightly different focus area. The opening quarter was dedicated to skill development, with a particular focus on the fundamental skills in AFL. Quarter two was a decision-making session where students had to problem solve a range of different puzzles. These puzzles required students to work in teams and use a range of communication skills to succeed.

In the third quarter, students continued with the theme of communication and were faced with a number of team-building challenges. The girls had many obstacles and reflected on the importance of effective and clear communication in a game of football. The final guarter provided an opportunity to use technology to test speed, reaction time and agility. Students used high tech speed gates to measure their 20m sprint speed and Blaze Pod's to test their reaction time and agility. The girls then reflected on the key learnings from the day and identified ways they can incorporate these into their own sport/life.






























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OPEN BOYS KO BASKETBALL > Strong Performance at The Lights
