complemented the Mass readings and prayers, highlighting the talent of our students' singing in such an austere and reverent setting. Mrs Carly Meakin worked hard with the students to produce a performance that appeared effortless, yet aptly captured the mood and atmosphere of the occasion perfectly. The event also served as a wonderful opportunity to meet the new Archbishop in person, whereby he took time and care to introduce himself and commend

Gleeson College has participated in the Arch D Podcast program since 2019, when Acting APRIM Mrs Monica Doherty first introduced the concept to her Youth Ministry students at the time, as a vehicle of self-expression, outreach and faith formation.

RELAY FOR LIFE 2021 > WE RAISED OVER \$11,600 TO FIGHT CANCER!

In a year that has been immensely impacted by COVID, it was looking like our annual participation in Relay for Life would not be able to occur in 2021. Yet, in the true spirit of the event – cancer does not rest, so why should we – the Relay for Life team as Cancer Council worked tirelessly to pull together this important date in just a few months, giving our students an opportunity to fight and give back in our Year of Service to this fantastic cause.

This year, approximately 30 dedicated Year 11 and Year 12 students fulfilled an outreach promise to give up their time in an effort to help others. They met at SA Athletics Stadium (formerly SANTOS Stadium) in time for the 1pm opening ceremony, and then proceeded to spend the subsequent 8 hours walking around a track lined with inspirational messages, memorial candles and fellow participants to raise funds and awareness in the fight against cancer.

The day (and night) incorporated a number of activities to engage relayers, while keeping them motivated and energised into the evening. There were tug-of-war competitions, volleyball matches, themed laps of the oval, live music and dance classes.

The festival-like atmosphere came to a halt, however, at 6.30pm when all present took time to celebrate cancer survivors, acknowledge the journeys of those currently fighting and remember those we have lost along the way.

Those present were reminded that cancer affects one-in-two people, so this part of the event was confronting, but important in inspiring all of us to do what we can to work towards a future where no one needs to hear the words “you have cancer” ever again.

By the closing ceremony at 8pm, fatigue was starting to set in, with many of our participants rarely taking a break from their laps. While this year's reduced format also depleted our total distance covered – our baton registered about 90 laps of the stadium, so not far off 40kms – we certainly did our best to make a difference by bringing awareness to this great cause.



As a Community, our students should be celebrated with pride, as our fundraising total currently sits at a little over \$11,600, in an event that raised close to \$90,000 collectively, which epitomises the value of this venture. **And, for those of you who wanted to donate but did not get an opportunity, there is still time to support this great cause! 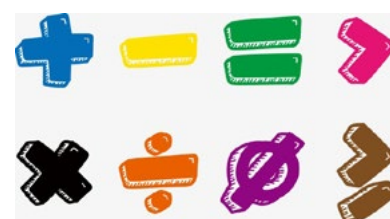

YEAR 7 MATHEMATICS PATHWAYS

> Term 1 Wrap Up



During Term 1, the Year 7 Mathematics classes began their Maths Pathway journey, and it has been extraordinary to watch their growth over the term.

Students came to us at the start of the year with a range of levels of ability and confidence, and the approach of the Maths Pathway teaching and learning model has enabled every student to learn what they are ready to. The focus for students is on mastering concepts; that is, gaining a deep understanding of mathematical concepts and being able to apply each concept to a range of contexts. This is enabling students to learn at a deeper level, rather than rushing on to the next item in the curriculum.

Data collected through the diagnostic testing through Term 1 indicated that prior to beginning Year 7 at Gleeson, the average student had mastered half of the concepts the Australian Curriculum outlines for learning from Reception to Year 6: their ‘mastery rate’ was 0.5.

During Term 1, 84% of students more than doubled their mastery rate: they mastered (which, again, is learning at a deeper level) more than one term’s worth of curriculum during this term.

As I have visited classes through Term 1 and into this term, I have been struck by the positive atmosphere and engagement of the students in all six classes, learning and mastering concepts they are ready to encounter.

Well done Aaron on this wonderful achievement and honour!



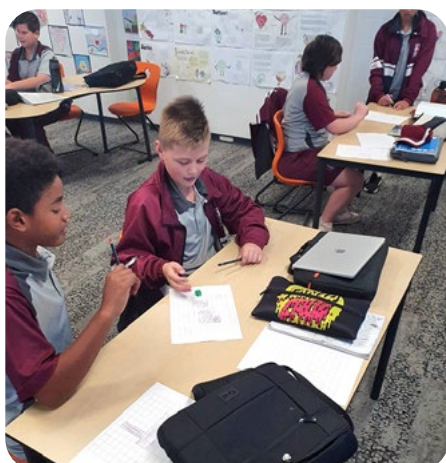
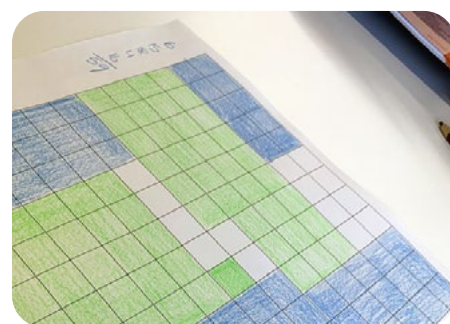
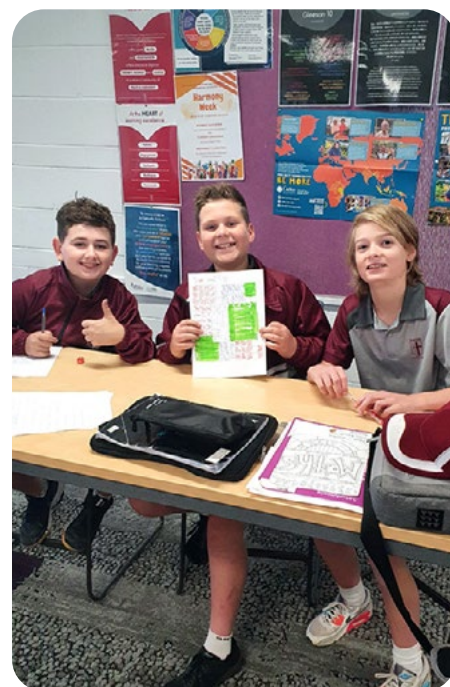
YEAR 7 MATHEMATICS PATHWAYS > 'Blockout' Rich Learning Task

Year 7 students have been using the Maths Pathways Program this year with great success. The students are engaging in a range of mini lessons and rich learning tasks throughout this program.

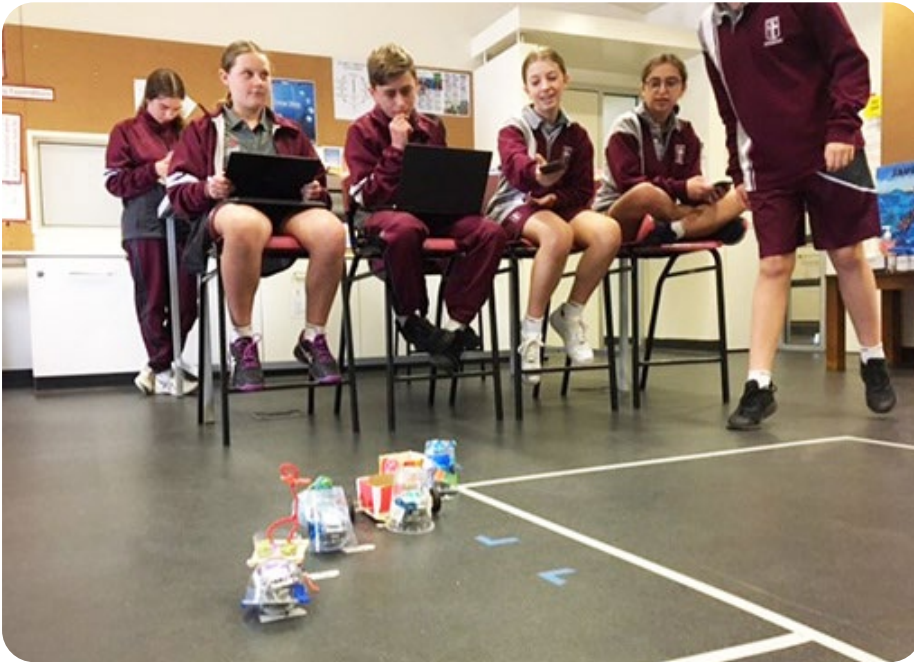
Recently, Miss Keatch's class completed the 'Blockout' rich learning task. This task was a class game that involved strategy, multiplication skills, problem-solving and chance, and reinforced both the skill of multiplication and the visual model that makes sense of it. After the game, students reflected on the skills they had learnt.

How to play 'Blockout':

Players choose colours, then take turns rolling the dice, and shading in a rectangle given by the dice rolls. If you roll a 2 and a 5, you can shade in a 2 by 5 (or 5 by 2) rectangle. No one can shade in a square that has already been coloured. If there is no room to fit the rectangle you rolled on the board, you pass. If all players pass in a row, the game is over. Players get a point for each square they have coloured in at the end of the game. The player with the most points wins the game!



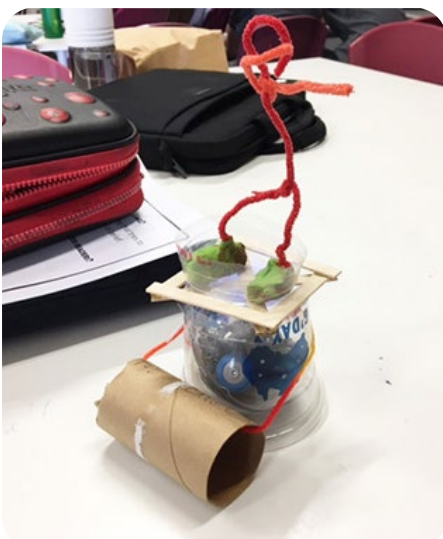
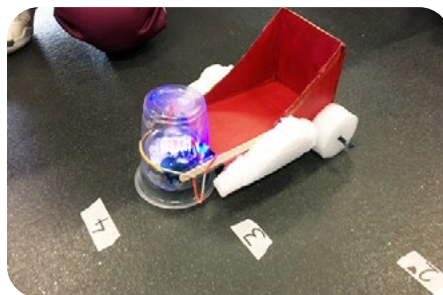
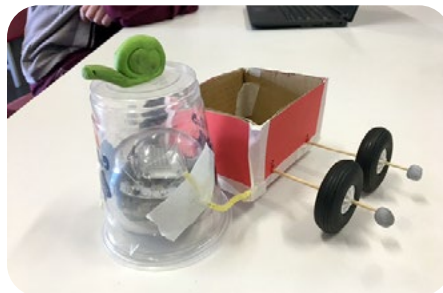
YEAR 7 SCIENCE › READY, SET, SPHERO!



This term our Year 7s have been learning about code through playing with robotics. Spheros are a robotic ball that uses the same mechanics as BB8 from Star Wars!

Students were challenged to write code for their Sphero to instruct it to illuminate pictures on the LED displays and to travel around obstacle courses. After designing a chariot to be pulled by their Sphero, the next task for our students was to participate in a chariot race where the main objective was to successfully carry a 20g weight around a track three times, whilst safely navigating the other chariots. Well done to all the students involved!

YEAR 7 FOOD TECHNOLOGY > Sandwich-Making + Plating + Eating!

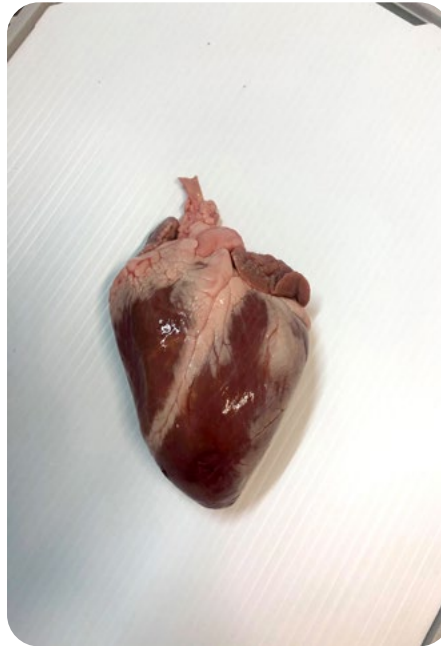
The Year 7 Food Technology class were busy in the kitchen last week!

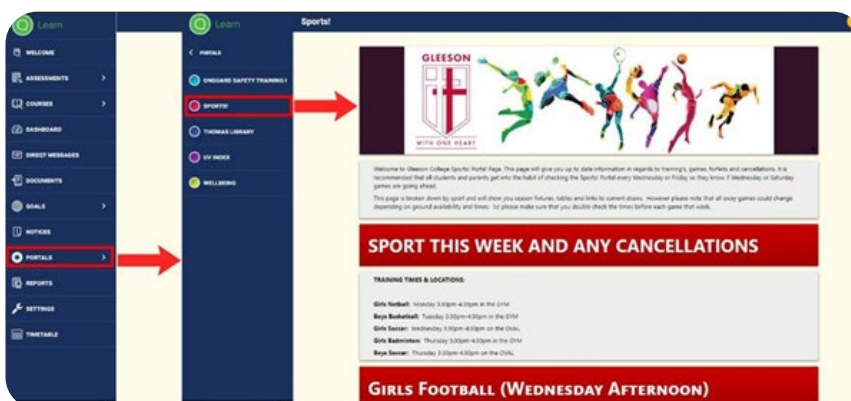
