

# MR CORBO + MR BOND VISIT MRS ROGERS' YEAR 7 MATHS PATHWAYS CLASS

On Wednesday of Week 6, Mrs Rogers' Year 7 class welcomed Mr Corbo and Mr Bond to their lesson. The lesson started with an energiser - everyone played the game Don't Break the Bank (see instructions below). Unfortunately, both Mr Bond and Mr Corbo broke the bank. After the energiser, students either continued with their individual modules, or joined in a mini-lesson with Mrs Rogers. Some students were completing the final diagnostic which they found really challenging! Mr Corbo and Mr Bond really enjoyed being able to speak with the students and to hear how they are finding Maths this year - lots of positive feedback from the students!

### How to play Don't Break the Bank!


Draw a 3x3 grid. Roll a single die and write the value in any one of the squares. Keep rolling and place each value as they appear in a square of your choice until you have filled all nine squares. The three columns represent the hundreds, tens, and units (from left to right). Add up the units (carry any tens into the tens column); add up the tens (carry any hundreds into the hundreds column) and then add up the hundreds.

So how do you break the bank? If your final sum is more than 1000, you have broken the bank and you lose like Mr Bond!

### Getting the Bigger Picture > Your Child's Mathematics Learning Profile

Maths Pathway is an incredibly powerful suite that matches sophisticated diagnostic testing with tracking of student learning to identify exactly what each student has mastered, and what they are yet to encounter. This data is used to curate the learning experience for students in Maths Pathway classes - allowing them to learn at their level what they are ready for.

Earlier this week, we gave parents of the Year 7 students who are using Maths Pathway access to the Learning Profile for their child(ren) through the Maths Pathway Parent Portal. You can see an example of this at right. This learning profile gives a comprehensive



picture of student learning: where they started this year (the yellow dashed areas), what they have mastered so far this year (the dark gold areas), and what they are yet to master (the light blue areas).

The Maths Pathway teaching and learning model is about learning at a deeper level: mastering concepts to build a strong foundation for the next concept. Under traditional teaching models, a basic proficiency of concepts is considered satisfactory to progress to the next concept (although, in

practice, all students move to the next concept, whether they're ready or not). This means that while nearly every student would have been taught in primary school, they still need some time to really learn it deeply in preparation for learning more advanced topics in number, algebra, measurement, geometry, statistics, and probability.

## YEAR 7 HaSS GEOGRAPHY > Mapping + Tim Tams!

Geographers use many different tools and skills to investigate the world in which we live. Maps are among the most important of these tools.

The Year 7 students have been learning about topographical maps, their principal elements such as longitude and latitude, grid references and area references. They are developing different conventions used in the construction of maps. They are now creating their own maps to demonstrate their learning.

When learning about topographic maps we used Tim Tams representing different features of the physical environment: the height, relief and slope of the land. It's amazing what you can learn and reinforce using food, let alone a delicious chocolate treat. Another bonus of biting into a Tim Tam is the visual connection to the layering colouring of landforms to demonstrate contours and high spots.

This was a learning experience certainly enjoyed by all as they analysed and matched their findings to their worksheets.

## YEAR 7 + YEAR 11 BUDDY PROGRAM > Australian Culture + Multiculturalism



To coincide with Reconciliation Week, and the 2021 message that reconciliation is more than a word, but takes action to bring real change, the final Buddy session of the term addressed this idea by guiding discussion between the Year 7s and the Year 11s around modern Australian culture and multiculturalism. The seniors were invited to guide real conversations on this highly important topic to help teach the younger students about inclusion and diversity in our world.

To add value to the stories and journeys of our young people, all were encouraged to bring in some recess that connected to their personal heritage. It was lovely to see so many kids eating something that showcased their background. There were plenty of Arnott's Shapes and Tim-Tams on display, along with some German cakes and waffles, as well as cannoli and tiralli, and even some British candy and chocolate, just to name a few.

While snacking and chatting, some of the provocations and discussion points addressed individual understandings of the meaning of multiculturalism, the positive and negatives (if any) of multiculturalism, what the world would look like if multiculturalism did not exist, why people may be afraid of multiculturalism, perspectives around assimilation and adoption of culture and language of new people to Australia, and thoughts around Australian identity in a multicultural world.

This session was one that was taken to with a real sense of maturity and responsibility by many of our students. It was a fruitful endeavour that enabled insights to the views and beliefs of the students of our community and provided a teaching opportunity for our Seniors.

Our next gathering will occur early in Term 3 and will aim to tap into the experiences of the Year 11s as they support and guide the Year 7s through the process of subject selection for 2022.

## YEAR 9 VISUAL ART > Lino Print Stickers






