f you had lived before the time of Jesus, you would have an entirely different view of God than you now have. Jesus introduced us to *Abba*, the God who is Father to us all. The more we read of Jesus' teachings, the closer we come to knowing God. Jesus said, "I am in the Father and the Father is in me." Thus, our view of our relationship to God is made clear by our understanding of family relationships. Here is a way you can cement that understanding while enforcing this week's message by making a family tree.

In a class, everyone should have a large piece of construction paper in front of them. At home, one large piece of construction paper will do. Also have various other scraps or pieces of construction paper or fabric so everyone can cut out small symbols.



On the large piece of paper, draw a tree with lots of bare branches.

Make symbols that represent each member of the immediate family. Symbols should be based on the most distinctive feature of each member (smile, helping hands, and so forth).


Paste the symbols for the youngest members on the lowest tree branches. As one moves up the tree, the symbols should stand for increasingly older people. Go as far back as possible in the family history.

At the very top of the tree, place a large circle with the words: *We are God's family* written on it.

For the following week, children should use the completed tree as a prayer starter at home. They can replace

customary dinner grace with the Lord's Prayer as they hold hands with each other around the table. This form of prayer is an excellent way of identifying each of us as a child of God.









othing is more important to your family than to keep each member following Jesus' way. If you give your children everything yet somehow lose sight of their spiritual needs, you fail them. 
