





Good Christian leaders are like good shepherds; they take care of those who follow them.



Jesus left people pretty confused when he started talking about shepherds and sheep. He preached about the qualities needed by good shepherds. The confusion arose when he said he himself was a shepherd. People knew Jesus had been a carpenter and was now a preacher. No one had ever seen him herding sheep. People wondered what in the world he could know about sheep.

Here's Jesus' explanation of what he meant: "It's true that I have never tended a flock of sheep in my life, and I didn't mean to imply that my job is to be a shepherd. My job is to lead people to God—to show them how to live so that their lives will be the best they can be. But there are many similarities between

the qualities of a good shepherd and of a good leader. I was trying to point them out in my talk about the good shepherd.

"As I said, a good shepherd can be trusted to lead his sheep in the right direction. The sheep know his voice and feel safe following him. It is only by following the good shepherd that the sheep will reach their proper destination.

"It's the same with a good leader. Good leaders always take care of their followers. Followers can trust a good leader's words. I lead my people like a good shepherd leads sheep. It is only in trusting my words and following me that people will learn how to live life to the fullest and reach God."

O'THER GREAT LEADERS LIKE JESUS



Mohandas Gandhi

Mohandas Gandhi was a Hindu spiritual leader from India. His followers called him *Mahatma*, which means "great soul." Gandhi did not approve of the Indian government's treatment

of certain citizens called *untouchables*. The untouchables in India had no rights. They weren't even allowed to look rich people in the face.

Gandhi did not think this was a good way for any government to treat its people, and he let the whole world know how he felt. He did not, however, believe in using violence to make his point. Instead he told the people to protest by peaceful methods. Until the day he was assassinated, Gandhi worked for the rights of his people.

Chiara Lubich

In 1943, Italy was in the midst of a great war. A young teacher named **Chiara Lubich** met with friends every day to pray for those who had lost their homes in the war. "Is there anything the

bombs cannot destroy?" they wondered. The answer came — "Yes, there is God."

Chiara and her friends made God their ideal. They chose words from the gospel to live by daily. Neighbors and friends, amazed at their joy, joined them. Chiara named her group *Focolare*, which means "fireside."

After the war, Focolare continued to grow. Today, Focolare centers are found around the world. Some members live together and others meet in one another's homes.

Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Even after Abraham Lincoln freed the slaves, the African-Americans in the United States were not truly free. There were places where they had to use separate drinking fountains, washrooms, and other

facilities. In some states, African-Americans were not allowed to sit in the front of the bus, and their children were not allowed to go to the same schools as other children.

A man who fought against this unfair treatment of millions of Americans was **Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr.** Like Gandhi, King believed in peaceful methods of protest. He led the people in staging "sitins." They would go to places that did not allow African-Americans, and then they would just sit there.

King spoke beautifully to his people of the day when all would be equal and truly free. Like Abraham Lincoln, Mohandas Gandhi, and Jesus, Martin Luther King was killed for his beliefs.



Pope John XXIII

Pope John XXIII was an important leader of our Catholic Church. In the early 1960s he called for a big meeting of Church leaders to talk about new things to help bring people closer to God. This meet-

ing was called the Second Vatican Council.

Because of the Council, many things in the Catholic Church are different from the way they were many years ago. Because of the Council, you now hear the words of the priest at Mass in your own language instead of Latin. Because of the Council, laypeople play important roles in the Mass.


Pope John did not change things like Jesus in the Eucharist or the gospels that teach us about him. But he did change our ways to worship God so that you could know and love God better.

Jesus was speaking to a great crowd on the mountaintop. One of the disciples mentioned to him that it was getting late and the people had nothing to eat. Jesus told them to sit down, multiplied a few loaves and fishes, and fed them all.

You can be good shepherds by sharing your food with others. This week, when you grocery shop, purchase one extra bag of groceries to be given to the hungry.

Another time when Jesus was speaking to the crowd, some children came up and tried to touch him. The disciples tried to send them away. But Jesus said, "Let the children come to me."

You can be good shepherds by caring for small children. This week, have the youngsters look through their toys and games and decide what they can share with less fortunate children. Adults and older children can volunteer some time working in the nursery during Mass.


