Our Lakeside building upgrade proposal is steadily progressing, with our initial concept drawings now submitted to the DET for their approval to proceed to tender. Significant works take time to come to fruition, but I am excited to see this project move to its next stage, and I hope to be able to share more with our community about this soon.

This year a team of our staff have also been working together to review and revisit our daily timetable; this will simplify our schedule to assist with the daily operation of our school, and allow more face to face teaching time with our Year 11 students. Revisiting the timetable means a considerable amount of thinking about all the ways this influences our day, from student travel constraints, to 'ideal' lesson lengths for different disciplines, accommodating all our curriculum and VCAA requirements whilst still allowing time for important features of our school program such as House, Form and School assemblies. We are fortunate to have had a great team of teachers volunteering their time and expertise to do this planning work; it is certainly the case that many hands make light work, and their commitment to this initiative has been marvellous.

Finally, I had the great pleasure this month to meet with a number of parents for some online chats organised by the Parents' Association. These sessions are a way for me to easily meet with parents, something that can be hard with our families far flung across Melbourne! We chatted about a range of topics and I look forward to meeting more parents as the months go on; please contact the PA for more information on joining one of our monthly conversations.

As spring approaches, we don't yet know what the weeks ahead will bring, but you can be certain whatever comes our way, we'll face it with optimism!

Students had to prepare and submit either a video or an infographic that explored neurodiversity.


The entries were judged on the following criteria:


- » Accuracy of information. Facts must be current.

# **Explain the Brain**

# Neurodiversity: Beauty within the Brain

Learning the importance of understanding that the brain of someone with a neurodiverse condition is not necessarily less capable but instead, just a unique variation of the norm.

Tasked with researching a topic to do with neurodiversity to be presented in an infographic or video for the Explain the Brain Competition, I came to understand, in the process of my research, why it was so important to recognise the things that made these conditions neurodiverse.

For me, this project motivated me to expand my knowledge and awareness on neuro-diversity. I was unsure on what aspect of neurodiversity to focus on but I chose Tourette's Syndrome, TS, as my focus after stumbling upon inspiring stories of how people coped with and embraced this condition. One particular girl on TikTok shares fun videos of her baking or painting, while experiencing tics, laughing with her viewers when she drops an egg or spills some flour.

From this research task, I learnt the importance of being aware of these conditions and how different people live with them. I learnt that a lot of what I already knew about TS was only a small part of what it meant to have this condition and for this reason I decided to focus on the many myths and misconceptions about TS in my response.

What I really loved about this competition was that you didn't need to be an expert on your chosen topic to participate and it was a really valuable opportunity for learning. I chose to participate because I really enjoy learning about neuroscience, how important it is to be aware of neurodiversity and not make assumptions about certain conditions and people with those conditions based on generalisations.





**Monday**: Our week started off with Monday's Multicultural Movie Screenings, where we watched some movies from Japan, France, Germany and America!





Mac.Rob is close to completing the Adelaide Exchange Lap of Australia (via Adelaide)!



# What is the School Council?

If you don't know what the Mac.Rob School Council is or what it does, read on!

The Council represents the whole school community (that's you) in governing the school. We don't run the school the way a company or private school board does, since the Victorian Department of Education and Training (DET) employs most of the staff and sets the curriculum, we still perform some important functions within the school.

The primary objectives of the School Council are to ensure that all school decisions that affect students have the best interests of the students at their core, and to enhance students' educational opportunities.



# What does that mean in practice?

We work with the school leadership to shape the strategic direction of the school and act as an informal sounding board, supporting the school with bigger picture issues that influence its future. An example is the adoption of the International Baccalaureate as an alternative to the VCE, which involves a multiyear planning and accreditation effort.

School Council sets budgets and approves expenditure of the school's discretionary funds. Those are the funds that are received from the Department of Education, through student fees and donations, and for specific purposes, like for excursions and camps. The money is spent on additional resources for almost every subject area and also on the library, ICT, buildings and administration. Recently we've been looking at a potential renovation of the Lakeside Building; this still needs to be approved by the Government but watch this space for developments.

Other Council functions include ensuring efficient governance and compliance with legal obligations under the Education and Training Reform Act.

In everything we do, we work closely with the Parents' Association, the Palladians and with Anne Stout, our Principal.

# Who is on the Council and how did we get there?

You elected many of us! Some years there are insufficient candidates to hold elections but this year, perhaps inspired by the upcoming US election, we had more than enough candidates to hold an election. Do you care passionately about the future of the school? Or want to change the school uniform policy? Run for Council! Elections are in February or March each year, and please vote, your voice is needed.
