
Last term we did mandalas, mine was a soccer one. I went on a tennis carnival and we learnt how to do Prodigy on the laptops.



Reconciliation Week - National Reconciliation Week runs annually from 27 May - 3 June


The 2019 NRW theme is...

Grounded in Truth Walk Together with Courage

#NRW2019 Campaign

At the heart of reconciliation is the relationship between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. To foster positive race relations, our relationship must be grounded in a foundation of truth.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have long called for a comprehensive process of truth-telling about Australia's colonial history. Our nation's past is reflected in the present, and will continue to play out in future unless we heal historical wounds.



Today, 80 per cent of Australians believe it is important to undertake formal truth telling processes, according to the 2018 Australian Reconciliation Barometer. Australians are ready to come to terms with our history as a crucial step towards a unified future, in which we understand, value and respect each other.

Whether you're engaging in challenging conversations or unlearning and relearning what you know, this journey requires all of us to walk together with courage. This National Reconciliation Week, we invite Australians from all backgrounds to contribute to our national movement towards a unified future.

What is National Reconciliation Week?

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

The dates for NRW remain the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey— the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision respectively.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Principal's Report

27 May - 1967 Referendum

On 27 May 1967, the Australian Government held a referendum. This was a momentous turning point in Australian history. The 1967 referendum altered the Australian Constitution. More than 90 per cent of Australian voters chose 'Yes' to count Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the census and give the Australian Government the power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

3 June - The Mabo Decision What is the decision?

The Mabo decision was a legal case held in 1992. It is short for Mabo and others v Queensland (No 2) (1992). The legal decision was made by the High Court on 3 June 1992. The High Court is the highest court in Australia's judicial system. The Mabo decision was named after Eddie Mabo, the man who challenged the Australian legal system and fought for recognition of the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the traditional owners of their land.

Childrens Safety at St Thomas More

At St Thomas More School safety of our students and community is one of our highest priorities. We provide a secure environment that allows the students to move safely around the school. Staff are clearly identified by the badges that they wear. As our school is fully secure, with fences around all areas, visitors must enter through the Front Office and sign-in upon entering the school. Safety in the yard encourages our students to play actively without fear. Each teacher on Yard Duty wear's a fluorescent vest and carries a bag that contains a first-aid kit for the treatment of minor injuries in the yard, more serious injuries are dealt with promptly in the sick room by staff who are trained in Senior First Aid.

St Thomas More School is situated on a main road and on a suburban street, which can make the movement of traffic difficult during peak school drop off and pick up times. To ensure that the students are safe during this time teachers are on duty at the school's front, ensuring the safe use of the school crossing on Yorktown Road and safely crossing Shillabeer Road.

We ask for your cooperation and patience.

Please observe the 'No Standing' areas and 'Yellow lines' around the school. These areas are to help provide a safe environment for the students. We **ask and expect** that all members of the St Thomas More School community follow the road rules associated with the 'School Crossing' (on Yorktown Rd) and all road signage stringently. They are also regularly monitored by the police and council and fines apply.

NAPLAN

This week students in Years 3 and 5 sat for the NAPLAN tests. Despite some initial nerves, students coped well and completed tests to the best of their ability on the day.

I thank all staff, in particular Sonia Kilmister for her work in assuring that all of the test materials were checked, distributed and then collected in a timely manner and Janie Gosling, Jess Jenkins, Linda Marsh, Sandra Shephard, Trish Olive, Raelene Smith, Michael Musico, Marilyn Kennedy and Leeanne Fisher for their work in administering the test.

All NAPLAN tests were kept secure until the day of the test and then all tests were checked and accounted for after completion. Parents will receive the results of the tests late in Term 3 this year.

Mercy Values

When teaching a Religious Education lesson in a Year 5/6 class the other day, I asked students if they could name any of our Mercy Values. I was thrilled to see hands shoot up all over the place and the students were able to name all the Mercy Values of Respect, Hospitality, Compassion, Service, Justice and Courage within the space of a minute. It is great that our students know these values and through careful teaching and by example from the adults in our school community, our students are learning what it means to truly internalise these values so that they become second nature. I love it when I am on duty and I get to 'catch' some of our students demonstrating our Mercy Values, because then I can acknowledge it by telling them how pleased I am with their behaviour and I get to give them a Mercy Value card. Some examples of the incidents I have witnessed lately include:

- A student helping another student up from the ground when they fell over during a footy game at recess time: Compassion card
- A student picking up rubbish on the ground without being asked: Service card
- A student including a child who was sad, with no one to play with: Compassion card
- Students playing fairly with each other and taking it in turns: Justice card
- Two students offering to help us pack up the Jubilee Hall after our whole school Mass last week: Service
- A student speaking in a kind and courteous manner to the teacher: Respect card

These are just a few instances of how our students are eager to show mercy in our school community. Maybe you can look out for examples of your children showing the Mercy Values at home as well!

Year 5/6 Students Visit Aged Care Village

On Tuesday, 14 May, I accompanied a group of ten Year 5/6 students as we visited Clayton Churches Aged Care Village on Shillabeer Road. This outreach program is underpinned by the Mercy Charism of our school and focuses on the Mercy Values of Respect, Service and Compassion. Through this program, we are able to connect with the elderly residents, to share our stories with them and to listen to them as they also share their stories with us. It was a beautiful sunny day for our short walk there and we all enjoyed a nice chat on the way. Our students had each prepared a Power point presentation to introduce themselves and kickstart conversations with the residents, which was followed by an afternoon tea of cupcakes, chocolate chipped biscuits, cups of tea and glasses of cordial. Judging by the smiles on everyone's faces, this visit was warmly received by all. I commend all students involved for their mature, respectful and cheerful attitudes.


There are a few ways we would love for you to help!

SPORTS DAY Friday 24 May

Sports Day will start at 9:00am on Friday 24 May. Students are to arrive at school at normal time. Parents, friends and relatives are welcome to join us. Sports Day will begin in the Jubilee Hall.

On Sports Day the students are required to wear their correct sports shorts and hat. Students are <u>encouraged to</u> <u>wear a T-shirt that reflects their team colour</u> on Sports Day. Students may also wear hair ribbons, socks and hairspray (to be put on at home and not brought to school).

Normal sunscreen is to be used – **NOT** coloured zinc cream. Class teachers will also have sun cream available for students to use. Students are NOT to paint their body with coloured zinc cream. Please remember to send your student to school with a labelled drink bottle.
